The position they say is, in their officion. extremely critical, and threatens a very serious breakdown throughout the country if ameliorative steps are not immediately taken. They give statistics to illustrate this Government neglect, showing that on of 1,349 lay teachers only 100 are in recount of a salary of \$200 per annum, and of hese 31 are heads of schools, while about per cent of the whole number of lay teachers are in receipt of salaries of less than £100 per annum. In circumstances such as these it is not surprising to find that some of the best teachers have left this country to take up teaching at higher salaries in England and Scotland, while others have abandoned teaching altogether for more remunerative employment at other callings. The Board have in the present state of things grave reason to fear as they state, that unless something is done immediately to ease the situation a considerable number of schools will find it impossible to retain or secure the required number of teachers to become entitled to the additional Parliamentary grant. There has been also a diminution in the grants, and in this respect the Board point out that the deficit on the basis of equivalent grants shows a somewhat for-The report, among other midable debt. things, tende to the realisation of how awry Government legislation is in its administration and application in this country and falls far short of the objects for which the promoters of the Intermediate Act strove. # THE ROYAL IRISH CONSTABULARY.

The Press Association says, in regard to the matter of inviting enrolment in the Royal Irish Constabulary, that the idea of the Authorities is to recruit not only for the regular constabulary, but to form an auxiliary force to assist in the restoration of law and order in Ireland. Ex-officers will, it is understood, be looked to largely for the building up of this auxiliary force, but the purely civilian element will be relied upon to some extent. The general idea is to place the matter of restoration and preservation of order in Irish hands as largely as possible.

## DEATH OF A CHRISTIAN BROTHER,

The death took place on Tuesday at John's Hospital of Brother John Joseph Cregan, a member of the Christian Brothers Community. The deceased, who was in his eightieth year, was a native of Bruff, and was greatly esteemed in the various Irish centres in which he did teaching work for the fifty years he was a Christian Brother. The interment took place to-day at Mount St Laurence Cemetery.
