Denis Rourke, a labouring man, was attacked near
Effin, in this County, on Monday night, by John Regan,
and his sister, who stabbed him with a knife and pitch-
fork. He died of the wounds on Wednesday. Regan
has been apprehended for the murder by Major Maxwell,
but the female has absconded.

On Monday last, a man named John Allen was fired
at and mortally wounded by an orchard-keeper, near Bally-
longford, while in the act of committing a trespass; he
died on Tuesday night, and his body was detained for a
Coroner's Inquest.

On Thursday last a man of the name of Wm. Dwyer,
who had been placed as keeper at Kilmacogue near Caner,
by the land agent of W. Quin, Esq. of Loloher-Castle,
died of a savage assault made on him by a number of
armed villains, while in charge of effects of the Widow
Egan, at the place above named, and where considerable
arrear of rent had been due to an excellent and most in-
dulgent landlord, Mr. Quin. On Monday last a man of
the name of John Hogan was committed to Clonmel Jail,
by Samuel W. Barton, Esq. charged with being concerned
in this murder—a murder, for the discovery of the perpe-
trators of which Mr. Quin has offered a spirited reward.
