A Letter from London by the last mail, advises, that the return of Lord Auckland (Mr. Eden) to London, from his commercial negotiation at the Court of Madrid, sooner than was expected, was not the consequence of his having been able to execute his commission in a short time, but on the contrary, owing to unfathomable (or more properly unforeseen) difficulties having unfortunately occurred while he was treating with the Ministers of his Catholic Majesty. This was the Revolution in France; by which the French Envoy at Madrid, (without whose concurrence the Spaniards would not go one step) not receiving any instructions from his Court, on account of the distracted state of the Gallic Councils, peremptorily refused his acquiescence to any of the articles pending at the time. His declaration of course threw cold water on the business, so that nothing was afterwards agreed upon but a few preliminary stipulations of little moment. Thus, this famous negotiation, from which so much was expected, turned out a mountain in labour.

The Colonels, Lieutenant Colonels, Majors, and Captains belonging to the different regiments now in garrison, have received cards of invitation to dine with Alderman Exshaw, Lord Mayor elect, on Wednesday the 30th inst. at the Mayoralty-house in Dawson-street.

Last Thursday night, as the packet with the mail and some passengers was got under way, a clergyman of the name of Foulks, who with two other gentlemen were returning to Wales, after visiting this city and its vicinity, was struck by the boom, shoved over board; and though the people on board the packet threw out an anchor immediately, and were assisted by the wherry which attended, from the darkness of the night their search proved ineffectual, and the gentleman was lost.—We hear the body was taken up next day by a Welch sloop, and carried to Holyhead.

Last Friday Mary Bready, house-maid to lord Shannon, hung herself at his lordship's house in Henrietta-street.—Her father, mother and brother were murdered by Joseph Daw, a few years ago, for which he was executed at Turvey-hill.
