The witnesses examined at the inquest held by the
Mayor on the body of Michael Ahern, who was inhu-
manly killed on return from the races, were Patrick
Nunan, Edmond Hickey, and Surgeon Franklin, jun.
The first deposed that he was in company with deceased
on way home in the evening, when a party of men ap-
proached them at Pennywell, one of whom knocked
down deponent without receiving any provocation. Im-
mediately after one Michael Sullivan, a pig-jobber, chal-
lenged deceased to fight, who refused, when Sullivan
struck him to the ground. Deponent then fled away.—
The second witness deposed he met Sullivan with two
men named Sarsfield and Hallinan, the same evening at
Pennywell; heard Hallinan say he had an old spleen
against deceased, and that he would have revenge. De-
ponent soon after met deceased and Nunan, and warned
them of what he heard, desiring deceased to take care of
himself. Sullivan seeing deponent speaking to the de-
ceased, followed deponent, struck and knocked him down.
Immediately after saw Sullivan strip off his coat, and, in
company with Sarsfield and Hallinan, go up to deceased
and challenge him to fight, which deceased declined, and
then Sullivan struck him a blow upon the forehead, and
he fell. Deponent then ran away from the scene, and saw
no further.—Surgeon Franklin, jun. described the con-
dition in which he found the deceased man, and said his
death arose from a contused lacerated wound on the right
temple; there were besides many severe contusions on the
neck and chest.—The Jury returned a verdict of "Wil-
ful Murder" against Michael Sullivan, John Sarsfield,
and James Hallinan.

A countryman returning home from the races this
week, was attacked by footpads, who beat him despe-
rately, and broke his right arm.
Thursday night about nine o'clock Bridget Donohue,
a young woman, wife of a smith in Creagh lane, deli-
berately flung herself into the Canal, and was drowned.
The Clare-street watchman heard a screech and the splash
of water. He instantly sounded the alarm, hastened to
the spot, and with assistance the body was recovered in
half an hour. Animation had fled, and her lifeless corpse
was carried home amid the lamentations of her friends.
She had been married about 12 months, and her unfortu-
nate husband was so shocked at the unexpected death of
his partner, as to evince a wish to jump in after her. An
inquest was held yesterday by the Mayor, and a verdict
of temporary insanity returned.

This morning a young female, not much above seven-
teen years of age, whose dress and appearance bespoke
respectability, flung herself into the Canal at the
mill stone, and would most certainly have perished but
for the very spirited and successful exertions of a man
named Gloster, keeper of a lock on the navigation, who
seeing part of her clothes in the water, plunged in at
the moment and providentially saved her from an early
grave. It was fortunate that Dr. Franklin, jun. was in
the neighbourhood on professional business, and he hasten-
ed to a farmer's house, whither she was taken by her
preserver. The young woman was in a most distressing
state of mind, after restoration to her senses, every at-
tention however was paid her, she became more calm,
and the enormity of the act she had contemplated was then
placed fully in her view, by the friendly exhortations of the
Rev Mr Malone, P.P of St Patrick's. She finally expressed
her acknowledgements for the interest which all around
evinced in her behalf, displayed the utmost contrition for
the rashness of her conduct, and most fervently thanked
her deliverer. From respect to the feelings of the young
female, we decline giving her name; but we can't suffi-
ciently manifest our abhorrence for the wretch who ut-
tered a report, at once malignant and groundless, against
her character. This reflection she could not bear, and in
a paroxysm of passion attempted the dreadful crime of
suicide. Happily the desperate resolution was frustrated.
