FURTHER PARTICULARS OF THE OUTRAGEOUS AND DREADFUL AFFAIR AT DROMIN.

Two strong factions stiling themselves the "Three Years Old" and "Four Years Old," whose acts have often been detailed on Criminal Trials in this County, assembled on Friday in great force on a hill called Cloher, near the fair green of Dromin. They had this meeting in contemplation for some months back, and made every exertion for a formidable appearance on the occasion. With this view they had prepared on both sides near 100 stand of fire arms, besides other weapons of a destructive nature, which they judged might be useful for their horrid purpose. The parties soon joined issue, and fought with great violence—but the "Four Years Old" unable to stand the shock of the adverse faction, who were much better armed, fled across the Country for two miles towards Athlacc, pursued by the others, who fired shots after them in all directions, by which, numbers were wounded, many so dangerously, that their lives are despaired of. On Saturday, Mr. Bennett the Coroner, held an inquest on one man, named John Carroll, a tailor, who happened to be standing near the fair green looking at the conflict, when he received a shot through the head which killed him on the spot. The savage disposition of those lawless wretches may be inferred from the fact of having threatened the life of an Apothecary from Bruff, whom they met going to visit some of the wounded; but whom they compelled to return without effecting his humane intentions. This daring violation of the laws was committed in the noon day, and what an alarming condition must the Country be in, when such ruffians are suffered to prowl about the roads and public places, carrying fire arms openly in their hands for the destruction of peaceable subjects, without any obstruction whatsoever. Frequently have they been cautioned by their Clergyman against those wicked practices, but in vain, for on this point his exertions are totally useless.

On Saturday night, an atrocious murder was committed near Kanturk. The victim was a perfect stranger, and his name is unknown. The body was found next day in a bog-hole, horribly mutilated, the throat and sinews of the arms and legs cut across. It was supposed he was on his way to Kerry to buy cattle.

The houses of two farmers, named Neenan and Sheedy, near Charleville, were attacked on Saturday night, by a party of armed men, who fired several shots through the doors and windows.

A party of fellows broke into the cottage of Nomills, at Castleblake, County Tipperary, on Tuesday, and took off a gun and a case of pistols.

A man named Purcell was killed on Saturday, in a fight between two parties at Thurles.

A boy named John Bailey met a dangerous accident from the blow of a stone, which fractured his skull on the quay of Blennerville, near Tralee, last week, and threw him into the river. He continues under the care of Dr. Crumpe.

The half-way house, between Ennis and Miltown Malbay, was wilfully and maliciously set on fire, about eight or nine o'clock last night, and totally destroyed, with the furniture.

Colonel Monsell's cider house, at Tervoe, was robbed on Friday, of a cart-load of pears, 3½ dozen of cider, and other articles. 10*l.* reward is offered for the offenders.

John Cussen, a labourer at the Wellesley Bridge works, was shockingly mangled in the head and face, on Monday, while sinking the shaft into a stone bed, where a blast was in preparation, which suddenly exploded. Pat. Grady, another workman, suffered severely in nearly a similar way at Rathcannon, on Friday.
