Mayor of Cork seized 400 loaves of bread, on account of being grossly deficient in weight.

Row races commence on Monday.

In the Recorder's Court, Cork, on Thursday, Mr. M. brought an action against Mr. Maulby, for the death of his children. Plaintiff was awarded 10*l.* 1*s.* 8*d.* 100*l.* claimed.

In the Petty Sessions, last week, John M., a tradesman, was convicted in a penalty of 5*l.* for work unfinished.

A licensed publican at Newry was convicted in a penalty of 40*s.* for refusing to admit on billet a serjeant of the 89th Regiment.

Hon. Arthur Cole, brother of the Earl of Ennismore, has arrived at Florence Court, after an absence of six years in India.

Funds of the Fever Hospital of Waterford are being collected.—An application is to be made to Government for a grant of 1000*l.*

Row Races terminated on Wednesday.—Mr. Bowen and Mr. Anthony Blake, and Mr. Edward Blake, were the winners of the prizes.

At the horse races, last week, Mr. Battersby's Seaford won the stakes of five sovereigns, and forty added.—Excellent heats.

At the horse races, the winning horses were Mr. Logan's Zette, and Mr. Fitzpatrick's Cockahoop.

A double-barrelled gun, the property of Lord John Russell, was stolen from his Lordship's residence in the Barracks, on Saturday last.

A riot broke out at eleven and twelve o'clock on Monday night, a quarrel arose between some men returning from a funeral. It was the consequence, in which some dreadful injuries were inflicted upon three men, James Crowe, Thomas Herford, and the father of the latter. These injured men were immediately removed to Stephen's Green. In about an hour after his removal to the hospital, Thomas Herford expired. Crowe, his companion, was dangerously ill. The perpetrators of this murder are supposed to be two men named Joseph and Thomas Barrett. The instrument used in the murder was a shoe-maker's knife, which was found by the police, covered with blood. Thomas Barrett was taken prisoner at Bowry, where the murder was committed. Joseph Barrett has not yet been apprehended.

A very serious charge, namely that of attempting to murder the person of a young female, was preferred on Friday last, before the Magistrates of College-street office, against the proprietor of a respectable establishment, not a hundred miles from the Black-rock.—A writ was sworn to as having been made so far as Tuesday-week last. The accused party has been committed to bail.

On Sunday, between the hours of twelve and one o'clock, as Mr. Saunders and family were driving out of Clontarf, the horse took fright near Ansley Park, and became so ungovernable, that the car was overturned, and the entire family thrown out on the road. Mr. Saunders is very dangerously injured, and one of his daughters received a very large contused wound on her head.

Thursday morning, the depot of the 11th Regiment left Cork Barracks for Spike Island, to relieve the Depot of the 10th Regiment, ordered to Cork.

The whole of the 26th Regiment, six companies of the 61st, and the Depots of the 16th, 49th, and 55th, are ordered to Chatham. It is supposed the 26th are destined for Madras, by New South Wales.

The left wing of the 67th Regiment, from Weedon Barracks, arrived at Manchester on Saturday; and the 36th Regiment, at Manchester, Oldham, and Stockport, are ordered to Ireland; they will embark in a few days.

The Depot of the 18th Regiment of Infantry, has received orders to proceed from Portsmouth to Plymouth.

Letters to the 1st of August, from the 84th Regiment at Jamaica, state, that the sickly season had been just commenced, and that they lost three officers, (Lieuts. Norton, Broom, and Quarter-Master Cockburn), within 11 days. The Fevers prevailed very generally.

James Tevlin, a soldier of the 37th Regiment, who formed one of the guard on the convicts from hence to the Dublin Penitentiary, on Tuesday last, lost his arm near Nenagh by a shot from one of the party whose musket accidentally discharged, the ball shattering the right arm of Tevlin. Surgical aid was had in the military hospital, Nenagh, amputation was of necessity performed, and the wounded man is now recovering from the unfortunate accident.

A serjeant of the 15th Regiment was killed a few days ago, at Maryborough, by an accidental explosion of gunpowder which he had about his person.

On Saturday, John Bennett, Esq. Coroner, held an inquest at Bruff, on the body of a soldier of the 37th Regiment, who it appeared died from intoxication.

On Monday, a man named Bluet was killed by falling from his horse, when returning from the fair of Dromin.

In consequence of the abundance of forage this year, inn-keepers will only receive one shilling a night for the Artillery, Cavalry, and Commissariat horses, on billet.

The Countess of Glengall has arrived on a visit at the Earl of Kenmare's, Killarney.

Alex. M. Alcock, Esq. has been elected an Alderman of Waterford, in the room of the late Alderman Morgan.

Alderman Huy is to be Mayor, and John Shegog and James Green, jun. Esqrs. Sheriffs of Drogheda, for the ensuing year.

The freedom of the City of Cork was voted to James Hewitt Massey Dawson, Esq. M. P. on Thursday.

The Bishop of Killaloe, acting for the Bishop of Limerick, will hold an Ordination at the Cathedral in this City, in December. Candidates for Priests' Orders are to be examined by the Rev. Dr. Forster, Vicar-General, and for Deacons' by the Rev. Mr. Woodward, of Cahernarry.

The Rev. Mr. Palmer, of Harcourt-street, Dublin, is appointed Curate of the Parish of Kilmurry, near this City.

The remains of Lord Ennismore were privately interred in the family vault, at St. Finn Barr's, on Thursday morning.

No demonstration has yet been made from any quarter of an intention to start a Candidate. It is possible that this state of things may continue for some days, as many of the personages who will of necessity be mixed up in the matter, are so removed from each other, that rapid communication and frequent intercourse cannot take place, Lord Kingston is doubtless at Mitchelstown, but the Earls of Cork and Shannon are in England.—The Earl of Bandon is at Castle Bernard, Mr. Hedges Eyre at Cheltenham, the Duke of Devonshire at Doncaster Races, and all these parties, or their confidential Agents, will have to communicate with each other before the County is told who is to be its Representative.—There has been an idle rumour, that already an invitation has been sent to Lord George Bessford to stand as a Candidate.—*Cork Southern Reporter.*
