Guernsey and Jersey want nothing but a Trial by Jury, as having already an Assembly of their States .-Conjecture may, however, reach to far, as to affert that, in process of time, even the natives of the Malabar and Coromandel coafts will feek that palladium of Brillish and Irish freedom, though faid to be inconfident with Eastern principles from the remotell periods of hiltory to the prefent; but furely no people in the world would give a preference to gloomy desporism, when contrafted with confitutional freedom, which carries in its pure and relatendent train, fecurity of life, property, and the effentials of every earthly bleffing. Mr. Necker observes, in his report to the National Affembly, that the King of England

enjoys the privilege of an absolute Veto, but would not dare to ufe it; but with all due deference to the information of to great a character, English, and oftentimes Irish bills, which had got the function of both Houses, have been cushioned by the advice of the British Privy Council. When any representation has been made for the return of fuch bills, the anfwer given is not indeed in the language of abfolure refusal, but in the following French expression, " Le Roi s'amisera," the King will consider of it. The impeachment of both Houses for high crimes and mifdemeanours, the Sovereign cannot fet aside or pardon, though he may refule figning the warrant of execution, but the delinquent must be kept close prisoner in the Tower. In that case, there can be no Royal negative, though a distinct branch of the Legislature.
