London Journals to the 27th inst. inclusive, have been received in due course.

From *The London Gazette* we have copied the last despatches from Marquis Wellington, the substance of which was given in our last. Respecting our affairs in the Peninsula, the English mails do not afford us any further information, but their sterility on that subject is amply compensated by the Dublin and Cork papers—they furnish us with intelligence from Lisbon to the 16th inst. as will appear by our extracts in a preceding column.

The report of Marshal the Duke of Ragusa (Marmont) relative to the battle of Salamanca, and some ulterior proceedings, will be found in the last page, as taken from the French papers—it is dated a week after the battle, and therefore must have received the opinion of Napoleon, in his northern quarters, before it could be laid before the French nation. This document lays eminent claim to perusal—its great length scarcely allows us to advert to it in general terms;—although it is more moderate in description than French statements generally are, yet, the observant reader will discover in various parts, evident marks of high colouring—nor is it surprising, in the present state of the French government, that he should use every endeavour to palliate before his master the defeat which he acknowledges.

From America there is not any intelligence later than what we have already communicated.

In a preceding column will be found a Russian Bulletin of operations before Riga—it presents a flattering view of the state of affairs in that quarter. The London Sunday papers, received by last night's mail, state, on the authority of French papers to the 24th instant, that the Russians have been forced out of their entrenched camp at Mojiesk, and compelled to seek safety by flight. This intelligence we cannot consider improbable, but it appears to have been first announced by the minor French papers, and without any official semblance; therefore it is not entitled to implicit belief. A Ministerial paper, *The Morning Post*, in pointing out the difficulties Bonaparte has to encounter, says,

“Even if the enemy should succeed in possessing themselves of Moscow, there is very little likelihood of their being able to endure the severity of the climate during the winter. The greater number of the invading troops were born and nursed in climes, whose ‘infant winters’ shrink into nothing, compared with those which prelude the Frigid Zones; and it is therefore not very probable that they will be able to live in a region where stern winter, joined to ‘grim visag’d war,’ rules the ‘desolate domain;’ or in latitudes, where the cold is so intense as to make the eyes even of the natives water when they walk out; and moisture so extracted, freezing, hangs in little circles on the eye lashes—where the beards of the common peasants are seen hanging on the chin like a solid lump of ice!”
