The loss of the Russians is stated at 40 or 50,000 men, of whom from 12 to 13,000 remained on the field of battle, and 5000 were made prisoners.— Russian Generals were killed, wounded, or taken. General Bagration was among the wounded, and the whole Russian army, consisting even after the loss of about 70,000 men, was said to be in full —It is reported, on the authority of private intelligence from Paris, that the French have entered Ireland, after again defeating the Russians. The evil which the success of Bonaparte may occasion is, as many apprehend, that it may influence the Government to make a precipitate peace.
