A barbarous and savage murder has been committed at Ballinahown, five miles from Athlone. The victim, a man named Dunn, was placed as a keeper on hay, &c. distrained for rent, and on his return from the auction was waylaid and shot—his eyes were torn from their sockets, his tongue cut out, and his body mutilated and disfigured in such a manner that it was scarcely possible to identify it.

Saturday night, Major General Murray's garden house, at Killenure, was broken open, and robbed of a quantity of fruit, vegetables, garden implements, &c.

Denis Keatinge, a debtor, escaped from Tullamore gaol last week.

On Sunday last, a child belonging to Mr. D. O'Callaghan, of Athlone, was accidentally smothered, in consequence of the servant-maid having closed up a press-bed in which it lay.

The funeral of Stanhope Fleming (who was stabbed by a Roman Catholic named William Carroll, at Moira, on the 3d instant,) was attended by at least 10,000 Protestants.—The Orangemen appeared without any badge of distinction, save hat-scarfs.

Monday seventeen convicts were transmitted from Mullingar Jail, to Cork, under an escort of the 27th Regiment. Amongst the number were three females, one of whom, Jane Doyle, was convicted of robbery and incest.

Last week, an inquest was held on the body of Marcus Lynch, of Tuogh, near Adare, who came by his death from a beating received from some fellows about ten days previous. Verdict accordingly.

Last week, John MacDonnell, Esq. of New Hall, county Clare, visited Kilkee and his estates in that neighbourhood. Early on the morning of his arrival the report of his expected visit reached the village of Kilkee, and a numerous body of his tenantry, dressed in their holiday attire, proceeded to Kilrush to welcome their landlord, and escort him on his way with every demonstration of respect and attachment.—The day was lovely, and the romantic scenery of the bay and surrounding cliffs appeared to peculiar advantage. Mr. MacDonnell, followed by a numerous cortege, inspected the improvements on his estates, and expressed much pleasure at the advance in cultivation that had taken place around that rising watering place since his last visit. He projected still further improvements, and laid out sites for the erection of dwelling houses, together with the plan of a new square, new roads, &c. One proof of the munificent spirit of Mr. MacDonnell it is our pleasing duty to record, and we do so as well for the beneficial effect so noble an example is calculated to produce on other landlords, as an acknowledgement due to the generous act itself, we allude to the munificent subscription of one hundred guineas towards the erection of a new Church to be built at Kilkee.

A fact of the Parish of Kilmoiley, in the Diocese of Ardfert, County of Kerry, is worthy of being more generally known.
