THE flattering regards of many attached Friends, had induced me to hope that it might not be deemed presumptuous in me, when a Dissolution of Parliament should take place, again to offer myself to your consideration as one of your Representatives, and to solicit a renewal of that support with which you had so often honored my Family, and which your great kindness had for five successive Parliaments conferred on myself.

Having discovered, however, and that very recently, that by the Act of 6th of Ann. an Office to which, by the favor of the Crown I have been appointed, disables its possessor from holding a Seat in Parliament, I have sincerely to lament, that family considerations will not permit me to resign a situation, which precludes me from availing myself of that friendship and countenance which I have hitherto experienced from you.

Permit me to assure you, Gentlemen, that no lapse of time, no change of circumstances, can ever efface from my heart the strong feelings of gratitude with which it is impressed, for the indulgent partiality manifested to me by my Friends.

But although I am debarred from offering myself as a Candidate to represent you in the senate, yet in all other respects, I hope to prove myself the warm, zealous, and firm supporter of every measure that may tend to the prosperity of our County, and to the welfare of its inhabitants collectively and individually; and the height of my ambition, the most anxious wish of my heart will always be, to deserve and retain your
