## AMATEUR BOY ACROBAT STRANGLED.

### Rope Entangled Round His Neck.

Newcastle West, Thursday.

A fourteen-year-old boy named Wm. Taylor, residing at Glensharrold, a few miles from here, was accidentally killed last evening under tragic circumstances. From details to hand it appears that the boy was practising some acrobatic feats when a suspended rope, on which he was performing, got entangled round his neck, and he was strangled before assistance could be rendered. An inquest was held on Thursday evening by Dr. Ambrose. Medical evidence was to the effect the death was due to asphyxia due to strangulation and a verdict accordingly was returned.

## BLACK WATCH RECORDS.
