BY THE LORD LIEUTENANT GENERAL  
 GENERAL GOVERNOR OF IRELAND  
 A PROCLAMATION.

NORTHUMBERLAND,  
**W**HEREAS, by an Act passed in the T  
 of his late Majesty's Reign, intitl  
 for the Suppression of dangerous Associations  
 bles in Ireland," a power is vested in the Lo  
 naut, or other Chief Governor, or Governors  
 by his or their Proclamation or Order, to proh  
 press any Association or Assembly, or Meeti  
 sons in Ireland, which he or they shall deem  
 gerous to the public peace or safety, or incon  
 the due administration of the Law, or any  
 renewed, or otherwise continued Meeting of  
 or of any part thereof, under any name or  
 device whatsoever ;

And whereas it hath been made know  
 Association or Assembly or Meeting of person  
 or is about to be formed in the City of Dub  
 the name of the Irish Society for Legal and  
 Relief, of the Anti-Union Association ;

And whereas we deem the existence of the  
 ciation, Assembly, or Meeting of persons to  
 rous to the public peace ;

We, therefore, the Lord Lieutenant Gener  
 neral Governor of Ireland, being resolved  
 the same, do hereby prohibit the meeting  
 Association, Assembly, or Meeting of Pers  
 adjourned, renewed, or otherwise continued  
 the same, or of any part thereof, under any  
 text, or device whatsoever ; and being det  
 resolved strictly to enforce the law and  
 thereof against all persons offending in the  
 charge and command all Sheriffs, Mayors,  
 the Peace, and all other Magistrates, Officer  
 whom it may concern, to be aiding and ass  
 execution of the Law, in preventing the me  
 Association, Assembly, or body of Persons  
 effectual dispersion and suppression of the  
 the detection and prosecution of those wh  
 notice, shall offend in the respects aforesaid
