On Tuesday night last, the house of Laurence Hogan, a respectable farmer, in the Parish of Fedamore, residing in the estate of Lord Egremont, was again visited at a late hour by a numerous band of nightly depredators, for the avowed purpose of murdering him; but not finding him at home, they proceeded with ropes, crow-bars, and other implements, which they brought for the purpose, to pull down his house, which they effected in a short time, and then departed, assuring his wife and family that the fate of the *Dillons* awaited him whenever or wherever he was found. They were about two hundred in number, and chiefly on horse-back.

On Sunday night last, a dreadful fire broke out at Woodville, near Parsonstown, the seat of the Rev. William Parsons. The servants would have been burned to death, but for its providential discovery by a person who was returning to Parsonstown. There were many articles of household furniture secured from the flames, but there were other things of value consumed. From the part of the building where the fire was first discovered, it is supposed to be the work of an incendiary, as there has been no occasion for fire there since last winter.
