

The Cork estate of John Bowen, petitioner, was sold on Thursday by order of the Commissioners, viz. Kilbeg to Mr. Sullivan, of Bandon, for 1,865*l.*; Kilbrogan for 2,735*l.* to Mr. Sullivan, Mr. Doherty, and Rev. Mr. Shaw; Roundhill 600*l.* Mr. J. Lane, Garrafeen, 3,610*l.* Mr. Fitzsimons and Mr. Bailey; Skull and Meenvane, 1,235*l.* Mr. T. Limrick; Glan 330*l.* Mr. Exham, Calvev 530*l.* Mr. T. Lacy.

The interest of John O'Brien, in Thomond-square, Cork, was sold on Friday for £1550 to David Beatty, Esq. Wexford; also the interest of Rev. George C. Nash in the mill premises, and the lands of Brinny to Sir Augustus Warren for £5,720.

There are nine vacant rooms in the Evan's asylum at Kilkenny.

John, eldest son of Sir John Power, Bart, of Kilkenny, a youth of 16 years, received a kick from a horse whilst present as a spectator at the recent review of the French troops at Boulogne, which resulted in inflammation of the intestines, and caused his death on the 13th.

The West of England insurance company paid last week at Kilkenny 1,615*l.* upon the life of the Rev. Charles Caulfield deceased.

An infant male child, about 9 days old, was found dead *this morning in a garden* belonging to Mr. T. O'Brien, near the back of the gaol. The body was found in a state of decomposition *in a sand-pit*. An inquest will be held this day. The body was not in the spot where *it was found last night!*—*Clare Journal*.
