It is now some time since we stated that Government had received accounts, that Portugal had placed itself under the necessity of acceding to France chose to dictate to it, and had agreed to pay a large sum of money, in the hope of this avoiding the presence of Angereau and his army. We have reason to believe, that the Portuguese will not only be cheated out of their money, but be obliged to maintain a French army, besides the Dutch, the Swiss, and the Hanoverians in the country. British property of course will be confiscated in that country, and if we have not succeeded in bringing away the effects of the Factory, the amount will be considerable—and in addition to this we shall be under the painful necessity of treating the helpless Portuguese as an enemy;—as otherwise Bonaparte would not only be able to draw resources from their country, but to aid his operations of invasion by embarking a part of his army from Portugal.

The order not to clear out vessels for Spain or Portugal, has we understand, been sent out to all our ports, but in fact we consider it only as a prelude to measures of actual hostility, especially in the former; and we believe that but few people will be inclined to think its neutrality should have been so long respected by this country. We are willing to believe, however, that Government will be able to assign good reasons for its long delay.
