The Premier's Advice.

The Prime Minister last night met in private his supporters in East Life. On the south side of the Tay, opposite Dundee, at Wormit, Mr. Asquith was interviewed by two Suffragettes, who wished to find out whether facilities would be given this session for progress with the Conciliation Bill. In reply, the right hon. gentleman said he could not promise facilities would be given, as the present session had only a month to go. The ladies stated that Mr. Lloyd-George and Mr. Churchill had voted against the Bill, and argued that their action seemed to show that facilities would not be given. The Premier replied that the vote of the Ministers named could not be interpreted as meaning that the Bill was not to receive further facilities for consideration.

At Taysport Mr. Asquith mentioned that his silver wedding with East Life was about to be attained. Referring to Tariff Reform, he said the circumstances of the present day were particularly strong against it. What was wanted in connection with the Constitutional Conference was patience and confidence—patience and confidence, he added impressively, which would be found not misplaced.

RATEPAYERS' ASSOCIATION

ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual general meeting of the County Limerick Ratepayers' Protective Association was held at For's Hotel to-day. Mr. T. W. W. Bennett, J.P., Chairman, presided, and there was a large attendance of members.

The Secretary (Mr. J. P. Rahilly, D.C.) submitted his annual report. In the course of his remarks Mr. Rahilly said the Association had maintained its reputation as an institution whose value was recognised throughout the county. Several new branches had been established during the year, and in view of that he had revised and simplified the rules, which, if adopted, would enable a branch to be founded in every parish. The report proceeded to comment on the administration of public funds and called attention to the

INTRODUCTION OF POLITICS INTO PUBLIC BOARDS to the detriment of legitimate municipal interests, and creating bad feeling amongst members. The report urged the electors to make it a condition of election of members to public boards that politics should be excluded from these boards. Attention was next directed to the surcharge made against the Co. Council in respect of the Limerick and Kerry Railway guarantee of £12,000 and regret expressed that the advice offered by the Association on the subject was not adopted by the Council. The Association had been invited to send a delegation to the Roads Improvement Conference, a compliment, which was appreciated. Reference was then made to the election of a Chairman of Limerick No. 1 District Council, and the report in conclusion alluded to the services rendered by the Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Treasurer to the Association, whose influence in the county had been for good.

The Chairman said it was only right that an Association of that nature should put itself in order in view of the conflict next June. While they would not necessarily see the organisation as a lever at the elections, they should at least see that the members likely to be returned to the various Councils were people who advanced the views inculcated at meetings of that Association from month to month. Their object should be to try and secure efficiency in the administration of County business, and the men returned to the public boards should be people that could be relied on to carry out the people's wishes. The introduction of politics into County and District Council meetings and meetings of the Boards of Guardians did not conduce to good, and he was of opinion that they should be excluded altogether. Politics in public boards often aroused angry passions, and prevented the business for which the members were elected being done. He looked upon the report as an admirable one, and desired to thank the secretary on behalf of the meeting for the care and thought which he bestowed on its compilation. (Applause.)

Mr. Meagher (Kilmallock) thought the allusion to politics contained in the report unnecessary. He did not think the Association should arrogate to itself the right to dictate what public bodies should discuss, and declared that some political policy beneficial to the country should be pursued. The report was then put to the meeting and adopted, it being decided to refer the question of revision of the rules to a small committee.

A resolution was sent in by the Kilmallock branch protesting against the action of public boards adding a number of years to the service of Public Officers when about being superannuated.

The motion was adopted.

CO-OPTION SYSTEM. Mr. James Bennett, Cronin, proposed a resolution, which was seconded by Mr. Meagher, calling on County and District Councils to do away with the co-option of members, as injurious to the best interests of the working of these Councils.

FEDERAL HOME RULE.

Comments of Lord Dunraven.

Lord Dunraven, writing in the Belfast Evening Telegraph, of yesterday, on his views on the latest development of the policy of the Irish Parliamentary Party, as indicated in Canada and the United States, says:— The change of front is evidently complete. Why was the operation undertaken? The purpose of the mission to America—and it is a perfectly natural one—is to raise money for an Irish party which is not adequately supported in Ireland. To give it a good send-off a great meeting was engineered in Limerick, at which the political principles of the party were enunciated; together with an urgent request for money. "Those are our principles—give us dollars or we perish." That is the essence of the Limerick speech. Shortly after the arrival in America of the mission totally different principles were laid down as constituting the programme of the party without, so far as I know, consulting the party. Such a proceeding gives colour, it must be admitted, to the suggestion that funds are more important than principles. The safe must be opened. If one key won't do it, try another. Conversion must I fear, be looked at, with some suspicion under those circumstances. The party may possibly prefer the Limerick to the American principles. I welcome conversion, however sudden it may be, but before coming effusive I think we had better wait and see how far the party will wheel into line. Unfortunately the mere change of policy without a complete change of tactics and principles is of very little use.

CLARE COMPENSATION CLAIM.

In the Court of Appeal yesterday, before the Lord Chancellor, Lord Justice Holmes, and Lord Justice Chryer, in the matter of the executors of Michael Glynn, deceased, appeal was heard by way of a case stated by the Lord Chief Justice from the Clare Assizes, arising out of the hearing of an appeal from a decision of the County Court Judge of Clare, awarding £28 10s to the appellant, Michael Glynn, in respect of the loss of cattle, sheep, and horses, which were maliciously driven off his lands in November, 1908. Glynn died during the hearing of the case, and the County Court Judge conditionally fixed the compensation at £28 10s, reserving the point as to whether the claim under the circumstances survived. Probate was taken out, and the executors continued the proceedings.
