In this country, where considerable sums of money  
are levied with great rigour, both upon the rich and  
the poor, for the purpose of keeping the public roads in  
constant repair, it is really very severe, that the want  
of necessary repairs should exist to a degree which re-  
flects discredit and disgrace. We have very respectable  
authority to state, that many parts of the very public  
and much frequented road which leads from this town  
to the town of Tuam, is at this moment impassable.—  
So great is the want of repair on that road, that a gen-  
tleman of high rank and considerable consequence, who  
had been recently at the latter town with a friend of  
distinction, wished very much to have come to Galway,  
and had actually made arrangements for that purpose,  
but was reluctantly compelled to abandon his intention  
for no other cause than the extreme difficulty, or per-  
haps impossibility which existed, of driving a chaise  
with safety. We are not advocates for the infamous  
practice of road jobbing; but we certainly think that  
the gentlemen residing in the neighbourhood of the  
road we now allude to, should have exerted themselves  
in order to procure such presentments as might have  
been necessary to keep it in a proper state. It may  
for aught we know to the contrary, be said, that pre-  
sentments have been obtained for the purpose, not with-  
standing the state of the road. We really know not  
whether such may be the case or not, but we shall make  
it our business to inquire, and in either case, we shall  
again call the attention of the public to this road, pre-  
vious to the next assizes.—*Galway Chronicle.*  
We give the following statement, shaped for our use  
in the words of a correspondent, upon whose veracity  
we confidently repose:  
"Unpleasant as the task must be for a journalist to  
record instances of infamy, it is, however, incumbent  
on each lover of peace and good order, to notice and  
apprize the community of atrocious or illegal acts, the  
commission or repetition of which, must eventually  
agitate, if not desolate the land.  
On the night of Sunday last a scene, shocking in  
idea, as detestable in consequence, was exhibited on  
Coolcarra and the adjoining lands, about five miles from  
Ballina:—a number of horned cattle were houghed,  
mangled, and killed, the property of honest and indus-  
trious people—besides, several sheep, some treated in  
like manner, and others stolen. Since the period of the  
disgraceful system of *threshing*, no such occurrence has  
been here known, nor even then, one so barbarous.—  
It is much to be hoped, that no such spirit of iniquity  
and insatiation is about to be revived; and also ear-  
nestly to be wished, that a prompt exertion of the ma-  
gistracy, combined with the vigilance of every loyal  
and peaceably disposed subject, may tend to the de-  
tection and due punishment of the nefarious perpe-  
trators, so that by timely checking a disposition so  
heinous, this country may finally repose in peaceful  
security."  
Thus far our correspondent—we have heard further  
that the magistrates in that quarter, where the offences  
were committed, impressed with a proper sense of their  
magnitude, have resolved to meet together, and con-

CORK, OCTOBER 28.  
Yesterday sailed the *Virago* gun brig, Lieut. Pitman  
and Bari Spencer cutter, Lieut. Bothwell, with the fleet  
of transports destined for Plymouth, having the 2d  
battalion of the 6th regiment and the militia, under  
convoy; as also the Admiral Martin, French privateer,  
for Portsmouth.  
His Majesty's ship *Jalouse*, Captain Morris, sailed at  
the same time with the trade for Lisbon, & Montezuma  
and Charles, South Seamen, who take benefit of convoy  
as far as the Rock of Lisbon.  
The *Hanadyad*, of 44 guns, Sir T. Staines, yester-  
day put to sea; the weather being so bad the two pre-  
ceding days prevented her working out.  
The *Hiberna* sloop of war, Captain Montrosser, waits  
the assembling of a sufficient number of vessels to pro-  
ceed with them to the West Indies.  
The Rev. Mr. Simkins, of this town, is appointed  
to act as chaplain to Admiral Thornborough's flag  
ship.  
The *Trent*, Captain Young, is employed as an hospi-  
tal ship.  
Lieutenant Moore has joined the *Jalouse*, vice Jones.  
WATERFORD, Oct. 29.—On Wednesday evening last  
a melancholy accident happened on our river. Six  
prisoers belonging to Turkstown, County of Kilkenny,  
who had been at the celebration of a wedding on the  
County Waterford side of the river, were returning  
home in a small cot, when it was swamped near the  
County Kilkenny shore, and, we are concerned to  
say, two men and a young woman were unfortunately  
drowned.

above place on Wednesday, before A. Gell, Esq. cor-  
oner for Westminster; and after a long deliberation,  
a verdict was returned—"Died by the visitation of  
God."
