FUNERAL OF SAMUEL DICKSON, ESQ. M.P.

This morning at half-past eight o'clock, the mortal remains of the late esteemed and regretted Samuel Dickson, Esq., M.P. for this county, were conveyed for interment from his residence, George's-st. to the family mausoleum at Croom. The mournful cortege moved off in slow procession, in the following order—200 of his tenantry, principally mounted, wearing scarfs and hat bands; the Lord Bishop and Protestant Clergy of the city, in clerical robes; the hearse bearing the coffin drawn by six black horses, in sable trapping, surmounted with white plumes, and supported at either side by pall bearers; chief mourners, comprising the immediate relatives of the deceased; then followed a long train of carriages, including the private equipage of deceased, Rev.
