the House to a circumstance of an alarming nature, and which particularly demanded interposition, viz. the present small affize of bread, occasioned by the great exportation of corn, and, as is well ascertained, an indifferent harvest: he remarked, that unless an immediate stop was put to this evil, in a short time the entire produce of the industrious manufacturer's labour would be insufficient to maintain a family. It was well known, he said, that the harvests of other countries had failed in a greater degree than our own, which had so encouraged speculation in the article of corn, that, notwithstanding the bounties granted by the nation on exportation had ceased, in consequence of the advanced price at home, yet the merchants continued to export it at their risque. He observed that it was incumbent on the Corporation of the city, to take such steps as would secure the poor of this metropolis from experiencing such distress as would unavoidably ensue if the present great exportation was not stopped, and concluded with moving, That a message be sent to the other house, proposing that a Committee should be formed, and empowered to make application to Government, for a prohibition to the exportation of corn for a limited time, which was agreed to, and sent to the Board for their concurrence.

Patrick Fay, who, in the month of July last, took his passage in a vessel bound for Halifax or Port Rosaway, in Nova Scotia, as a felon, under a rule of transportation for life, arrived lately at Bourdeaux from Liverpool, with a cargo of cheese and earthen ware, in quality of a free merchant.

In recording such worth and benevolence, we draw from reality, unexaggerated is the praise, which though it can add nothing to the gratification of his departed spirit, little to the consolation of his friends, yet operates as a comfortable example that a life spent in the best security for esteem and affection, the best victory of his temper forsook him not till the hour of his dissolution, no second childishness, but vigorous and unimpaired were all his faculties, and to speak with the moral poet:

"His age was like a lusty winter, frothy but kindly."
 In short to be universally admired, he wanted but to be universally known.
