Such is the extent of the information—the private accounts, however, are most anxious for further intelligence—our reports to be some leagues in advance from us, if this is correct, we may expect to hear of the Marquis coming in warm contact with Joseph and his satellites. Marmont is said to be much pleased, the late reports of large supplies from France unwinded into pristine nonentity.

**NORTH.**—Our preceding page teems with interesting information from this portentous scene, so stained with carnage and devastation. We only allude to the most prominent features. The distance from the vicinity of Riga is not so encouraging as former accounts would lead us to believe, though it may damp previous expectations, it is the whole of a discouraging tendency. Bonaparte reported to have advanced towards St. Petersburg. It is also said that he has brought mechanics from Paris to rebuild Moscow—and another report at the 23d bulletin had arrived in London with the prospect of a battle, in which the Russians were defeated.

Bonaparte's advance be true, the first town of consequence in his route is Twer, which he might reach in two days—this place is considered to be the centre of supply for St. Petersburg. We fear the Russians are not in much force in that vicinity, Bonaparte gains possession of Twer, he will cut off the supplies for his troops, and cut off the principal point of St. Petersburg.

A Swedish expedition, it is now said, is finally decided—this treachery has long been dreaded. The official bulletin of despatches from Lord Viscount, and the Russian accounts, we shall not suppose they are flourishing, but the reader will use his discretion.

We learn that the Emperor Alexander has determined to secure his person in Finland, he has already ordered all his valuables, and has every thing in readiness to convey himself to the fortress of Sveaborg when necessary. The Russian fleet, it is said, has been brought to a British port.

**AFRICA.**—We cannot turn to the present prospects of transatlantic affairs without much nausea. As we have already said, the only resting place that now offers for hope of an amicable adjustment, is in the election of a new President, and this pinnacle it must be considered rests on a very tottering foundation. In the course of the present year will be found much information of interest in American affairs, but in reviewing them the caution of the reader must be extremely guarded—speculation runs so high in America, that it is difficult to ascertain what accounts are correct.

The general election is fast approaching to a conclusion in some places, however, the contests are still going on with unabated ardor, as will be observed on our next column.

The election for the co. of Carlow, is over—Col. O'Connell—and Mr. Bruen are returned—Mr. Bagenal being any farther contest. On Tuesday evening, Mr. Ogle was unanimously elected a representative in Parliament for Drogheda. On Tuesday last, Henry A. Herbert, Esq. was elected member to represent the Borough of Tralee, in the county of Kerry. He is an elderly man, and rather grey. It is reported that his Royal Highness the Prince Regent, is about to confer some gracious marks of his favour on the Peerage of both countries; it is said that the Earl of Londonderry is to be raised to the dignity of Marquis, and Lord Mountjoy to be created Earl, by the title of Earl Blessington, Lord Dufferin to be a Viscount. Tuesday the Clare militia left Woodbridge barracks, for Ipswich; they are replaced by the 54th regiment. The 2d battalion of the 39th regiment has removed from Weymouth to Exeter. Major Gen. Hay is removed from the depot of heavy cavalry at Canterbury, to the staff in Ireland. The Sligo regiment of militia, stationed at Dunmow, Braintree, &c. have received orders to march for Norman-cross. A court martial has been held in Halifax, on board his Majesty's ship Africa, for the trial of Capt Dacres, the surviving officers, and crew of his Majesty's late ship la Guerriere, for the surrender of that ship to the United States frigate Constitution, on the 19th of August; Vice Admiral Sawyer, President Captains Sir J. P. Beresford, P. V. Broke, J. Bastard, and C. Gill members. After mature consideration, the court came to an unanimous decision, honorably acquitting the captain, officers, and crew. The decision also expressed the high sense the court entertained of the conduct of the ship's company in general, when prisoners; but more particularly of those who withstood the attempts made to shake their loyalty, by offering high bribes to enter into the land and sea services of the enemy.
