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in the yard, for the purpose of washing casks, and after filling the vessel, he was in the act of removing the shoot through which the water issued, when his foot slipped, and he was precipitated into the boiling water; immediate assistance was afforded him, but notwithstanding the best medical efforts were used to save his life, he died on Saturday night.
On Tuesday last, the Town Council of Paisley agreed to Petition the Prince Regent to prohibit distillations from grain; and a suitable representation on this interesting subject has been transmitted to the first Lord of the Treasury, to be presented by him.
On Thursday night last, a poor baker going from Drogheda to Duleek, was shot in the arm by a band of robbers, (at the head of which we understand the noted Collier is,) which so disabled the poor man that he fell from his horse, when they robbed him of every article of value in his possession.
On Saturday night last, in consequence of the driver of the fly, a Scotchman, being intoxicated, the coach upset, it was likewise overloaded. A Mr. Blandon, of the Yarus Mills of Navan, was so severely hurt, that he survived but a few hours; one poor woman had both her arms, and another one arm broken; these two hurt and another that was very much bruised were taken to the Dundalk infirmary.
On Thursday evening last, a party of sailors belonging to the large foreign ship, detained in Belfast harbour, having been on shore at the Whitehouse, for recreation, on attempting to return to the ship the weather was so boisterous that the boat could scarcely be got off with safety; one of the sailors, a foreigner, then jumped out of the boat, the water not being above his middle, with intent to return to shore. His comrades expostulated with him to accompany them to the ship, and even laid hold of his jacket to detain him; he however, unhappily persisted in his resolution to return, and forced himself out of their hands, leaving his jacket behind, in the struggle. The boat then left him, and returned to the ship; nothing more was heard of the unfortunate young man until the next morning, when he was found drowned.
On inspecting the different wards of the gaol in Waterford on Wednesday last, the gaoler discovered in the one occupied by Archibald (a convict under sentence of transportation, for an attempt to the Bank of John Redmond, Esq.) a skeleton key, concealed in his bed, which, on being applied to the door of his cell, readily opened it. In the chimney was found a loaded pistol, together with a stick, in which was affixed a spring bayonet. By the vigilance of gaoler, the intention of this ruffian to escape, has been frustrated.
A very melancholy accident occurred in this city during the night of Monday last. About seven o'clock that evening, it began to blow very fresh from S. W. By eight, the gale had increased to a perfect storm, and between twelve and one, we lament to say, the upper part of a gable in Milk Lane was thrown down by its violence, and falling on a neighbouring house much lower than the one of which it was a part, drove in a considerable portion of the roof, by which three fine boys, of five, seven, and fourteen years of age, sons of Pierce Power, cooper, were unfortunately killed. Two of them were found dead—one was got out of the ruins alive, but expired shortly after—and a young girl, sister to the unhappy sufferers, who slept on the same floor, was miraculously preserved. Her mother had providentially placed a chair at the bedside in such a position that when the roof fell in, it supported the tester of the bed, until she crawled out. We are happy to say, she sustained no other injury than what the alarm of her awful situation may be supposed to have occasioned. The parents who slept on the floor below, escaped unhurt. The Christian fortitude of the afflicted mother, on this melancholy occasion, equalled any thing of which we ever heard.—*Waterford Mirror.*
An establishment for vaccination has been formed at Canton, which has most beneficially extended the new practice through a great part of the Chinese empire.—Some idea of its advantages may be estimated, when it is known, that on a moderate computation, one-tenth of the children in China, heretofore died annually of the small-pox.
To Farmers—Suppose the land which has never been limed to be in fallow, and afterwards cropped successively with corn, till it will be necessary again to fallow it; suppose also, land limed and fallowed, and afterwards cropped in like manner—Quere, under which practice will the land be less injured? As the cropping under the one of these methods will probably continue longer than that under the other, before it will be necessary again to fallow, the comparative state of the land should not be considered till the period of both requiring fallow again. Let it also be supposed, that the land which was not limed, had applied to it, during its cropping, only such quantity of the manure of the farm as the farmer who thus crops is enabled to give it. An answer to the above might produce some useful information.
On Tuesday night three ruffians, stiling themselves caravats, entered the house of a Policeman named Shearman, at Drama, near Kilkenny, and after searching for arms found an old sword, which they carried off. Shearman communicated the matter to two gentlemen of the name of Enarie and Geale, who, with the policeman went in pursuit of them, and, after a sharp conflict, wounded and took prisoner the leader, and lodged him in the county Gaol. The other two made their escape, but not without leaving behind them three guns, a blunderbuss, and the old sword belonging to Shearman.
Committed to Clonmel Gaol, by Richard Sadleir, Esq. Bryan Shanahan, charged on the oaths of Richard Lahay and Thomas Carew, with being the person who, in the month of May, 1798, with a hurl, struck Cornelius Ryan, of Raheen, farmer, by which he came by his death, as fully set forth in their joint informations.
Lord King, as it is generally reported in Surrey, not satisfied with the decision of the public judgment against him respecting his demand of payment of rents in specie from his tenantry, has persisted in it through the whole receipts of his late Michaelmas audit.
The Master of the Irish Rolls, Mr. Curran, has been down on a visit for some days to Sir Francis Burdett, at Wimbledon.
It is expected that Mr. Wilberforce, Messrs. Thorntons, Mr. Eanks, Mr. Hawkins Brown, and others of that party, will turn their thoughts next Session to the prosperity of the *Island of Saints*!
Cove, Nov. 6.—H. M. ship Fortitude, Captain Vansittart, put back on Monday evening, not being able to beat out.—She attempted again yesterday, and with no success, and remained with H. M. ship Saldanha, Hon. Capt. Pakenham, Jalouse, Capt. Morris Stork, Capt. Leggett, and Helena, Capt. Montresor.
On Monday the brig John and Mary, Mathews master, was wrecked near White Bay.—The crew fortun-

All persons who have arrived from Alicante, which is garrisoned by a part of this division, state that the soldier-like appearance, order, regularity, and discipline of these troops surpass all belief. This is the first proof of the good effect produced by a British officer commanding Spanish troops, who only want instruction to be made the best in Europe.
The first division of the British army in Portugal, under the command of Lieut. General Graham, consists of the 1st battalion of the 28th, and the 42d and 79th regiments.
It is reported, that the embarkation of a brigade of cavalry, and two brigades of infantry, intended for Lord Wellington's army, has been suspended for the present. Some general officers and staff, intended for his Lordship, are stopped for the present. It will be seen that the destination of one General officer, Gen. McFarlane, has been altered—he is gone to Sicily.
Lieut. Gen. Brownrigg, Governor and Commander-in-chief of Ceylon, with his family and suite, has set off for Portsmouth, where the African frigate is in readiness to receive him.
The very large fleet with strong reinforcements for our armies in Spain, Portugal, and the Mediterranean, it still detained at Cowes by adverse winds. General Leith, Ross, and Bothwick, Colonels Moore, Bradford, Thoroton, &c. and a strong body of men have been on board this fleet for the last six weeks.
A fleet which carries out reinforcements of men and officers for regiments in the West Indies, is about to sail from Portsmouth.
Colonel La Touche's fine regiment, the Carlow, and Col. Irwin's regiment, the Sligo militia, have arrived at Spithead.
The Carlow were landed at Portsmouth, and marched to the gay town of Chichester, where they will be quartered for the winter. The Sligo goes on to the Downs.
The Glamorgan militia are going immediately to Ireland.
The Earl Spencer cutter has arrived at Plymouth, from Cork, with six transports under convoy, having the King's county militia on board. The North Devon are to embark immediately on board the same transports, for Portsmouth. The King's county had a most tempestuous passage, but they all arrived safe.
Captain Bingham, late of the Little Belt, has been promoted by the Admiralty to the rank of Post Captain, and appointed to the Volage.
