On Sunday last, George Nicholls, Esq. Poor-law Commissioner, visited the Newcastle Workhouse. The number of paupers in the house is 294.

At eight o'clock, on Monday morning, Mr. Nichols, Commissioner of Poor Laws, in company with Dr. Phelan, Assistant Commissioner, and Mr. Wilkinson, Architect of the Board, visited the Workhouse on the North Strand, and minutely inspected the whole building, after which they proceeded for Tipperary.

Mr. Thomas Blackwell, Apothecary of Ennistymon, has contracted for vaccinating with the Guardians of that Union, at the rate laid down by the Poor Law Commissioners.

There are now four candidates for the vacant Coroner'ship in Clare, viz. Messrs. Healy, Roughan, Shannon, and Martin.

John Shaughnessy, a tailor, residing on Arthur's-quay, died suddenly yesterday morning. He was in good health the previous evening, and remained up at work until three o'clock, when he retired to bed, but subsequently arose to give one of his children (who was sick in measles) a drink; having done so he again went into bed, but he had not been five minutes lying down when his wife discovered he was a corpse! The deceased was a man of temperate habits, a native of Kilmurphy, and has left a wife and five children.
