The heartiest well-wishers to the cause of
liberty in France must agree, with regret, that
the Assembly have lost too much time in frivo-
lous disputes. They neglected to profit by the
fervour of the nation at the onset, and have al-
lowed their minds to cool, while they have
been debating matters scarcely more important
than the nonsense of the *Robin Hood*.

Extract of a letter from Paris, Oct. 20.
"It is impossible to conceive the present state
of distraction in this metropolis. All is confu-
sion, apprehension and mistrust. Without law,
without government, without police, and con-
sequently without protection. What will be
the event, it is impossible to conjecture. If I
might hazard an opinion, it is, that it will end
in a restoration of absolute monarchy. Le
Fayette has lost much of his popularity. The
republicans quarrel much among themselves;
they debate; they order; they countermand;
they do much, and they do nothing! They
began without a plan. Every individual is a
legislator. The people are in a state of con-
tinued intoxication. All commerce, and all
manufactories are at a stand. The kingdom is
impoverished, and the people want bread:—
Mean while the King and Queen seem perfectly
resigned to their fate; but I am much mistaken
if a sudden resolution in the army will not very
soon produce another revolution in favour of
the degraded Monarch. Foreign troops are
certainly expected on the frontiers, and there is
great reason to believe that the French troops
begin to repent of the steps they have taken;
and I am very certain that the bulk of the
French nation wish heartily for a restoration
of their ancient form of government."

Orders have been sent to England for 400 000
quarters of wheat, to be shipped for France
whenever the ports are open for the exportation
of corn.

A few orders for tierce and provision beef,
are at last come to hand, to the great joy of
the few speculators that have this year engaged

Some of the English newspaper geographers
inform us, that Marshal Laudohn may now
march up to the gates of Constantinople—thus
confounding Belgrade in Servia, with Belgrade
in Romania. Belgrade where Marshal Loudohn
is triumphant, is 400 miles North West of
Constantinople. The other Belgrade, which is
a small town, seated on the Straits of Constani-
tinople, about 20 miles from that city. The
Turks, however, have no fortified place be-
twixt the great fortress of Belgrade, now lost
to them, and Constantinople.
