

or was not justifiable is not the question—we only ask what can sanction the murderous usurpation of the French Ruler over the subjects of Russia.

The French conspirators, it appears, have been tried, sentenced, and executed—an account of the trial will be found in another column.

The return of Bonaparte to Paris is confidently rumoured; but although he is even stated to have arrived in Koningsburg on his route, and the report may be probable, yet it is not entitled to implicit credence.

**THE PENINSULA.**—In this quarter we much regret the state of affairs is not very encouraging.—Although we do not give much credit to the French vapouring accounts, we cannot divest ourselves of dread on an attentive contemplation. Some of the London papers that have heretofore been most sanguine in their expectations of success in Spain, have changed even to a desponding tone—they strongly hint that blame attaches somewhere; but as they are not explicit, we will not conjecture, particularly as the approaching meeting of Parliament will most probably expound the whole.

Madrid appears to be the present bone of contention; and report adds, but we are happy to say, very vaguely, that the French are already in possession of that capital.

Our anxiety increases for official advices—some fears have been excited by a report that ministers had received despatches from Marquis Wellington which they did not promulgate, but feel much pleasure on finding the report contradicted as altogether erroneous.

The Right Hon. Lord Massy has nominated the venerable and Reverend Mr. Massy, of Clonbeg, one of his domestic Chaplains. This is his fourth appointment to that situation in that family, by four successive generations. On Thursday morning his Lordship set out from his elegant mansion at Hermitage, accompanied by his uncle Colonel Fitz-Gerald, M. P. for the county of Clare, to pursue his studies at Trinity College, Cambridge.

On Saturday evening last, the Right Hon. Maurice Fitz-Gerald, M. P. arrived in this city from Kerry, and on Sunday morning proceeded to London, to attend his duty in the Imperial parliament.

Lord George Taylor has arrived at his seat, Quinsborough, near this city.

**CATHOLIC MEETINGS.**—The Catholics of Dublin, Kildare, Leitrim and Queen's county have already met, and entered into resolutions renewing their petitions to parliament—expressing their grateful thanks to their friends and supporters—and determining to immediately register their freeholds, that they might be enabled to support the return of their friends to Parliament on every opportunity which may offer. The Catholics of the county are to meet for a similar purpose on Thursday next.

In our number of Tuesday last, we briefly noticed the Dublin Catholic meeting. We this day report the proceedings, but the accumulation of important intelligence precludes the possibility of detailing the speech of Counsellor O'Connell. It would have already appeared in this Journal, were it not for the length of Col. Hutchinson's speech on the close of the Cork election, to which we are induced to give precedence and have accordingly this day concluded.—We even fear that in our next, our limits will necessitate a further postponement, as we are in possession of Mr. O'Connell's reply to Mr. Pennefather in the action of Taaffe v. the Chief Justice, which will then occupy a considerable portion of our columns.

The Protestants of Sligo, Cavan, Leitrim, Longford, Monaghan and Armagh, have prepared Petitions against the Catholic Claims. A Petition, of a similar purport, is lying for signatures at the Mansion-house, Dublin. John Aiken, Esq. High Sheriff of the county of Fermanagh, has refused to call a meeting of the Protestants, for the purpose of petitioning against the Catholics.

In the King's Bench in Dublin, on Wednesday last, a conditional order was granted for an attachment against Richard Martin, Esq. late member of Parliament for the county of Galway, for having sent a message to the Right Hon. D. B. Daly, the object of which was to provoke Mr. Daly to fight a duel.

Mr. Ponsonby and Mr. Leader had not been long arrived when the Sub-sheriff appeared, and stated to the deputy that it was the desire of the High Sheriff that the third proclamation should be forthwith read. Mr. Gregg then addressed the court, complaining in strong terms of the conduct of the Sub-sheriff, and asked if any answer would be given to the notice which had been served on the High Sheriff by Mr. Ponsonby and Mr. Leader. Mr. Baggs, the Sub-sheriff, entered into an explanation of his conduct as to the service of the notice—he stated that he had not received any instructions relative to that notice, and added, that he had not had any communication with the High Sheriff since that notice was served. Mr. Leader and Mr. Ponsonby severally, but briefly addressed the electors, and lamenting the indisposition of the Sheriff, and regretting that the necessity of compliance with the directions of their legal advisers, obliged them to inconvenience the Sheriff by the service of the notice on him in his bed-chamber, they had already given their opinion as to the proceedings, and would not now trouble the electors present with any further comments. The law of the land pointed out a proper tribunal for the investigation of such subjects, and to that tribunal they would appeal! The third proclamation was then read, and Lord Bernard and Mr. Hare were declared duly elected representatives of the county of Cork.
