

g down the Hall, on the left hand side, a tent object meets the eye in the form of a tent, which is divided into men and women's apartments. In the latter may be seen a sewing mill, a water jar, a cradle, a sieve for sifting chaff from the corn, and a goat skin for "milk"; while in the men's apartments are a shepherd's club, a coffee mill, implements of sport, and the like. The entire tent (of the chieftain of the tribe) is dominated by a

Next to this is a model of a North Indian, made of bamboo, straw, and mud, and here are a variety of curios peculiar to this continent. The Home Organisation stall illustrates the various agencies by which the Church of the Bible Society performs its work, and the other is devoted to the Hibernian Auxiliary of the Bible Society. At the end of the Hall is the African Court, and it may be marked "en passant" that it displays a very different contrast from the other portion relating to that country, one part being full of idols and other having none. On the right as you go the Hall is the China Court, where many curios are seen, amongst them an ancestral tablet, a "fil mask," the goddess of mercy and of wealth. At this stall, as at others, are maps with the names of the Church Missionary Society underlined in red. At the Japan Court may be seen a Shinto shrine, and the ordinary furnishings of a Japanese house. It should be mentioned that at the end of the room is a stall for the sale of country produce, in charge of Mrs Ormsby Ryan, Ballyvaughan, Newport.

In the Lecture-room downstairs costume scenes are being presented, and in the Council-room are a refreshment table, presided over by Mrs Brown-Carass Court.

A new Exhibition programme will be issued to-day, and on each day at 2.30 there will be a special opening ceremony. To-morrow General Dromkeen will discharge that function, and other officers will be Brigadier-General Coffin, V.C., and Mr William Waller.

It may be added that the sale of foreign goods at moderate prices affords an opportunity of showing international sympathy with Foreign Missions. A large number of postcards of scenes abroad, books, etc., will also command a ready sale.

The Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Exhibition is the Rev Chancellor Waller; the General Secretary, Rev T De Clare Studdert, and the Organising Secretary is Mr F H Reynolds, of the Exhibition Department of the Church Missionary Society.

The Opening Ceremony.

The Exhibition was formally opened at 2.30 p.m. to-day in presence of a large attendance of clergy and laity.

The Venerable Archbishop of Limerick presided, and the proceedings commenced with the singing of the hymn, "Jesus Shall Reign," at the conclusion of which prayer by the Archbishop followed, and the Chairman then introduced the Lord Bishop, the Right Rev Dr Orpen.

The Bishop, in opening the Exhibition, said it was not so much from the financial point of view they were asked to attend the Exhibition, but what was more important, namely the purpose of deepening and stimulating the interest in which some people took in missionary work, and awakening interest in others who did not take that concern in the work. The time in which they lived was one in which great opportunities were being afforded for missionary work abroad. In several parts of the world there were great "mass movements" of enquiry about the heathen in so far as Christianity was concerned, and it would be very culpable on the part of their Church not to take advantage of these opportunities. His lordship appealed to

In reply to Mr Moran, the witness said the result of the wound received on the 8th was the only cause of death he could find. He did not believe any old injury existed.

Dr J M Curtin corroborated.

Mr Dodds addressed the jury, and asked them not to prejudice the case. James Keays had already been returned for trial for an assault on the deceased, and the probabilities were that he would be charged with the more serious offence and returned for trial to the Assizes. They had only heard one side of the case, and he asked them not to come to any decision that would prejudice the issue in another place.

Mr Moran also addressed the jury, and pointed out that he did not want a verdict of manslaughter or anything like that against the man who undoubtedly, according to the evidence, struck the deceased. What he asked the jury to say was that he was responsible for his death. If he were not responsible why then did he not come forward and make a statement that would satisfy them.

The jury found that death was due to asthenia following injury and effusion into the ventricles as a result of injuries received at Dromkeen on the 8th October.
