Monday night, William Humphreys, a native
 of Birmingham, private in the 79th Cameron
 Highlanders, put a period to his existence, by
 shooting himself with a musquet, at his quarters,
 in the New Barracks. The unfortunate man
 was subject, it is stated, to temporary derangement,
 after drinking spirituous liquors. The Mayor
 having held an Inquest on the body, a verdict of
 insanity was returned.

One of the misguided men who was shot by

 our last.) died on Monday night, at a house in
 Boherbuoy. The wretched man was named
 Patrick Kerley, from the vicinity of Bohermore,
 and by occupation a labourer.

 Jail.

The peasantry in the neighbourhood of Mr

 stones. Although scarcely ten minutes elapsed
 from the time of his calling upon a Peace Officer
 until a military guard was on the spot, yet not a
 single man could be secured. A similar outrage
 was committed at the House of a Butcher, named
 Sheahan, in Mungret-street, by the same party—
 at this place they were identified, and informations
 against them have been sworn to. The Mayor,
 Alderman Watson, and several High Constables,
 patrolled the streets with military parties
 for some time after, which, with the appearance
 of a strong picket of the Scots Greys, prevented
 any further mischief. These were incursions
 by the "United Trades." A word on the

 to give them the reception they ought to get,
 (such as was given a few nights since by Mr.
 Fitz-Gerald,) and it may be presumed they will
 not be taken by surprise—if there was a garrison
 of 5,000 men, it would be insufficient to prevent
 a few rabble rascals from rushing down one lane,
 breaking windows, and running off by another—
 the way to prevent it, is the mode above pointed
 out.
