It may not be improper, at the present crisis, to
 insert the following Abstracts from the Act for the
 defence and security of the Realm, and for inden-
 tifying Persons:—

Sec. 1. To procure returns of men of 15 and un-
 der 60, distinguishing such as are infirm, and who are
 yeomen; and also which of them are willing gra-
 tuitously or otherwise, to supply certain matters spe-
 cified for the public service, with a return of such
 articles—A return of the Quakers, as also of such
 persons male and female as may be incapable of re-
 moving themselves; concluding with general powers
 to Governors for carrying into effect these purposes,
 and others.

Sec. 2. Governors, &c. to appoint proper per-
 sons to direct and superintend the execution of the
 several duties necessary to be done for the purposes
 mentioned.

Sec. 3. Governors may require the attendance
 of all persons, whose assistance may be necessary
 for carrying into execution this Act.

Sec. 5. All Persons shall obey such Orders, as
 they shall receive under this Act.

Sec. 7. Governors, &c. may upon emergency,
 or the requisition of Commanding Officer, order
 the removal or destruction of, &c. &c.

Sec. 10. Directs the manner in which the
 General or other Person authorised to take Ground,
 shall be given possession of same by Justices or De-
 puty Governors, if the Owners shall object, &c.

Sec. 11. Directs how compensation shall be
 ascertained for matters removed or destroyed.

Sec. 17. Penalty for disobeying Orders, or ob-
 structing the execution of this Act, upon summary
 conviction by a Justice, fine not less than 5l. or
 more than 100l. and in default of payment, im-
 prisonment for three months.
