**FUNERAL OF THE LATE MRS.

The funeral of this venerable and highly-  
 esteemed lady who passed away on the 26th inst.,  
 at her residence, Richmond Terrace, in her 90th  
 year, took place on yesterday morning at ten  
 o'clock when the remains were removed to St.  
 Mary's Cathedral with which she had been con-  
 nected for all but five years of her long life. After  
 the service the remains were removed for inter-  
 ment to the family burial place, Meelick,  
 county Clare. Many friends assembled to  
 pay a last mark of respect to the  
 memory of the deceased lady who was con-  
 nected with some of the oldest families in Lime-  
 rick and Clare.

 looked upon the Temple of the Lord as her home,  
 and told him that from a very tender age she was  
 attending service at the old Cathedral of Lime-  
 rick. A more faithful member of the Church it

 as she expressed it herself, rest with Christ. She was  
 confirmed by Bishop Jebb, and was the only  
 survivor of his acquaintance who remembered that  
 distinguished Prelate.
