Resolved-That we cannot restrain the expression of our feelings, in the strongest terms, or that we cannot find language to express our disapprobation of our Irish Representatives, professing themselves liberal, yet acting directly contrary to their constituents, and in opposition to the straight-forward and virtuous exertions of the Representative of all Ireland-Daniel O'Connell.

Resolved-That a debt of grafitude be due most particularly from our Guild to our distinguished Representative, Thomas Spring Rice, E.q.
