Repeal of the Union.
AT a Meeting of the Guild of Masons and Brick-
layers of this City, held at their Hall-Room, on
the 29th of November, 1830, for the purpose of Petition-
ing both Houses of Parliament for the Repeal of the
Union—Mr. WILLIAM CRONIN was called to the
Chair, and Mr. PATRICK MAGRATH was requested
to act as Secretary.

The following Resolutions were unanimously adopted:
Proposed by Mr. Ambrose Walsh and seconded by Mr.
Francis Farrell.

Resolved—That the Legislative Union between Eng-
land and Ireland is the great source of the misfortunes of
this country, as it tends to create absenteeism, and to
drain from her the produce of her soil, and deprive the
working classes of that source of employment so essen-
tially necessary for their existence.

Proposed by Mr. John Stokes and seconded by Mr. John
Howard.

Resolved—That we cannot restrain the expression of
our feelings, in the strongest terms, or that we cannot
find language to express our disapprobation of our Irish
Representatives, professing themselves liberal, yet acting
directly contrary to their constituents, and in opposition
to the straight-forward and virtuous exertions of the
Representative of all Ireland—Daniel O'Connell.

William English.

Resolved—That a debt of gratitude be due most parti-
cularly from our Guild to our distinguished Representa-
tive, Thomas Spring Rice, Esq. M.P. for his unwearied

ring such measures as will be serviceable to Ireland.
