# LIMERICK UNION.

Mr. Patrick Bourke, Vice-Chairman presided at the meeting of the Limerick Board of Guardians yesterday. The names of the other members present are given below.

## CO-OPTION.

Pursuant to notice of motion, Mr. Robert Frost proposed—"That the Board co-opt a member for the Market Ward in succession to Mr. Thomas Coffey, resigned." He begged to move that Mr. Michael McKnight be selected to fill the vacancy. Mr. Mulcahy seconded the proposition, which was carried unanimously.

## FEVER HOSPITAL ACCOUNTANT.

Alderman Donnellan proposed that Miss Hamilton, Fever Hospital Accountant, be supplied with apartments in the institution.

Mr. Madden seconded the motion.

Mr. G. Frost said he received no notice.

The Clerk—I cannot answer for that. The notice left the office here.

Mr. Frost—There is another Guardian who did not get notice either—Mr. Enright.

The Clerk repeated that notices had been sent to all the Guardians.

Mr. Frost did not persist in his objection, and the resolution was carried, the officer's father giving an undertaking to furnish the apartment.

## VERANDAHS FOR CONSUMPTIVE WARD.

Mr. Sheehan next proposed the notice of motion standing in his name, namely, to provide verandahs for the consumptive ward. He emphasised the necessity for the work being carried out, and said the Guardians would do a good day's work by facilitating the occupants of this ward.

Alderman Donnellan seconded the motion.

Mr. Humphreys proposed a direct negative, which was seconded by Mr. Enright.

In reply to Mr. McNamara, Mr. O'Malley, Engineer, estimated the cost of the work at £60; that was if they were to make the improvements effective.

In the division, the voting was for the negative—N. Humphreys, J. F. McDonagh, M. Keane, C. McNamara, M. O'Neill, J. Fitzgerald, P. Mulqueen, J. O'Halloran, M. Hannon, J. Enright, G. Frost, H. Stephens, R. Frost, M. Hayes, C. O'Neill, and J. Catill—16.

Against—M. Cuddihy, J. P. Griffin, J. Lawlor, P. Mulcahy, M. Murphy, M. Sheehan, D. Kiely, J. Hassett, J. P. Lynch, J. P. Rahilly, T. Forde, Alderman Donnellan, J. Madden, and K. O'Brien—14.

The resolution was declared lost, and Mr. Griffin said the verandah would eventually have to be put up. The Resident Medical Officer had told him so.

Mr. McNamara—I think the Resident Medical Officer ought to attend to the poor and not dictate to the Board.

Mr. Griffin—He did not dictate to the Board nor to me, because I would not allow him.

Ald. Donnellan—There was no dictation at all. We all know that the Resident Medical Officer has the interests of these poor people at heart, and when he makes a suggestion it ought to be listened to.

An animated discussion followed.

Dr. McDonnell explained that Mr. Griffin asked him if these verandahs were essential, and he said in the interest of these poor people they were, and that they must be erected sooner or later. That

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
