DEATH OF WILLIAM S. SAUNDERS, ESQ.

With profound regret we have to announce the melancholy fate of this much esteemed gentleman, whose connexion with the city of Limerick, as the most efficient and courteous Secretary of the Waterford and Limerick Railway, had endeared him to every class in society. Mr. Saunders left this city on Saturday, for Dublin, *en route* to London, on business of the Company, in connexion, we understand, with the loan about being advanced by Government for completion of the line to Waterford. On Sunday evening he proceeded from Kings-town to Holyhead, where, after the steamer *Eblana* had reached her berth at the landing pier, a passenger was heard to fall into the water when about getting ashore in haste, but for some minutes it was unknown who the individual was. Prompt efforts were had recourse to by boats and otherwise, but the unfortunate gentleman never rose above water alive! After a search of a quarter of an hour, the body of Mr. Saunders was found close by the paddle wheel. The mournful intelligence of his death was received by his wife and young family, yesterday, in this city, to their inexpressible grief and affliction.

It is a remarkable and melancholy coincidence that the first wife and six children of Mr. Saunders were drowned off the Cape, on passage from the Mauritius to England about 13 years ago; on the occasion of which most distressing catastrophe, Mrs. Saunders' two sisters, brother-in-law, and her mother, were also victims!
