Yesterday, the Mayor held an inquest on the body of an infant found dead in the river at Barrington's bridge. Surgeon Franklin, on examination ascertained that the child was born alive; and the Jury found a verdict of wilful murder against persons unknown.

Daniel Minehan, who fell into the Long-dock a few nights past, and received a very bad compound dislocation of the ankle joint, died of the injuries this week.

Sub-Constable Burke and party, of Ballyneety, arrested on Wednesday night William Grady at Knockroe, in this County, charged with the murder of Thomas M'Namara at the fair of Ballynegard on the 12th June, 1833, since which time the accused has evaded the search of the police. He is committed to the County Gaol by John Croker, Esq.

Francis Crosbie, William Sandes, jun. and William Hickey, Esqrs. Magistrates of Kerry, rendered every assistance with the Coast Guard, to protect both life and property, when the brig *Thetis*, of this port, struck upon Beal bar last Monday morning.

We are concerned to state that 44 half bales of contraband tobacco have been found concealed on board the *Thetis* by Lieut. Tripbook and crew of the *Hamilton* revenue-cruiser, and Mr. Dexter, chief officer, and men of the Coast Guard at Beale. The greater part was secreted in the seamen's berths, and five bales among the cargo (timber).—The master, Younghusband, and crew have been marched in custody from Tarbert to Tralee gaol, to abide the usual investigation. The vessel herself will, it is feared, become a complete wreck, but the cargo is safe.

The *Valiant*, outward bound, which went ashore below Beale bar was assisted off by the Coast Guards, and *Hamilton* Revenue cruiser, but no salvage has been demanded for the service given.

Monday morning a fire broke out in the Corn Stores of Messrs. Gallagher, of Ballina, Mayo, which has done considerable damage. It originated in a kiln used for drying corn.

Friday night an armed party attacked the house of a game-keeper, near Ballymore, Westmeath, and fired a shot through the window, fortunately, however, without injuring any of the inmates. The keeper immediately jumped out of bed, and seizing his gun fired at the assailants. The shot evidently took effect, as one of the party fell, exclaiming, "by the L—d I'm kilt." The others immediately fled, but on the wounded man screaming to them not to leave him, they returned and bore him away. A gun loaded with slugs, and a quantity of blood was found next morning on the spot where the man was observed to fall.
