CO. LIMERICK FARMER'S ESTATE.

In the Chancery Division, before Mr Justice Pim, in the matter of the estate of the late Timothy Kennedy, farmer, of Garravane, Rea- cross, Co Limerick—Kennedy v Kennedy—an application was made on summons on behalf of the plaintiff, Michael Kennedy, of Farneigh, Newport, Co Tipperary, executor, for an order for the administration of the real and personal estate of the deceased, under the direction of the Court, and the execution of the trusts of the deceased's will dated 12th June, 1920.

It appeared that the deceased, who died on 14th June, 1920, bequeathed all his property to his executors, the plaintiff and one William Kennedy, in trust for the benefit of his surviving children, five sons and three daughters, as the executors thought fit to apply it; and probate was granted to the plaintiff on the 23rd Sept last. The entire assets of the deceased, consisting of a farm of land of about 308 acres, in Garravane Upper, and a considerable number of cattle and sheep, etc., were estimated to realise about £6,000. The defendant, Philip Kennedy, a son of the deceased, was in possession of such of the assets as had not been realised, and had realised portion of the assets, for which it was stated he had not accounted.

Mr Justice Pim made an order for administration under the direction of the Court in the terms of the will.
