Another disgraceful outrage was committed at Drew's  
Court, in this County, on Wednesday night last, similar  
in its nature to the forcible abduction of the Widow  
Cowie, from her father's house, and in the same neigh-  
bourhood, a short time previous. A band of ruffians,  
armed with naked scythes, attacked the dwelling house  
of James Leahy, a comfortable farmer, near Drew's  
Court, and made an entry by the thatched roof, having  
been unable to force the doors. They immediately  
revealed their intentions, by seizing and dragging from  
under the protection of her father's house, and in spite of  
the cries of her family, Ellen, the daughter of Leahy, a  
girl of 17 years of age, whom they succeeded, in spite of  
every obstacle, in carrying off to the County Cork, and  
have not since been heard of. A brother of the unfortu-  
nate girl, assisted by some of his neighbours, attempted  
a rescue, but in vain; he was driven back, and two of  
the party continued sentry at the door. How deplorable  
is the state of the country, when an outrage of so pecu-  
liarily infamous and aggravated a character is committed  
in a populous neighbourhood, and how torturing to the  
feelings of her afflicted family and friends.

Thursday Major Maxwell sent the Police in various  
directions in quest of the party, and we are happy to say  
that the Girl was restored to her father on Thursday  
evening. The principal man of the party is known.

A man named William Riorden, who was in the em-  
ployment (as Land-steward) of M'Gillycuddy, of the  
Reeks, was a few days since killed by fall from a car, on  
lands of Whitfield, County Kerry.

A man named Riordan has been apprehended for  
attempting to assassinate Mr. F. Fitzgerald, near Killor-  
glan, on the 19th ult.

the County Police, apprehended at Abbeyfeale Thomas  
Scanlan, for stealing two horses from Mr. Griffin, near  
Tralee.

The fair of Six-mile-bridge on Wednesday, presented

were much in demand and at increased prices.

of. Pigs were in great demand and carried high prices.
