KILMALLOCK RURAL DISTRICT.

454 To construct a bridge about 32 feet in width over the river Mahore, in the townland of Ball hawkish, on the road leading from Knockaigrey Killeely. The work to be carried out subject to the County Council loaning out of the County Fund, or obtaining a loan at 4½ per cent interest repayable over three years, for the purpose of sewer work (District Council to provide the money themselves); rural district charge; not to exceed £25

No 469 To fill up a dangerous gripe on the side of the road between Glenoheen cross and the Greenwood road, about 15 perches; district charge not to exceed £35.

No 473 To lower and reset the footpath leading from Kilfinane to the convent, between Mr O'Rourke's gate and the R.C. Church, about 10 perches, on the road from Kilfinane to Bruff, in the county at large and half district charge; not to exceed £49 10s. (The Chairman and Mr O'Connell to meet, inspect and report on this work with the County Surveyor)

LIMERICK NO 1 RURAL DISTRICT.

No 170 To put special repair on the old road Mountbawn, near Gardenhill; district charge not to exceed £10

No 171 To put special repair on the road from Rag road to Michael Barry's gate at Knockan gurteeny—400 perches; district charge; not to exceed £35.

No 9 T To make a new road from Ryan (Gardener's) house at Turlagher, by prolonging the existing road, as far as the country bounds at Gleno Newtown, where it connects with the road in Tipperary County; at a probable expenditure of £960 480 perches long; to be raised as a district charge on Limerick No. 1 Rural District by way of loan from the County Council; not to exceed £960. (Mr Davison to meet Mr Moynan, Co Surveyor, North Riding, Tipperary, and report back for adjourned meeting; work to be proceeded with when proposed to continue the loan on the Tipperary side passed by Tipperary N.R. County Council.

189. To repair about 50 perches of the road leading from the main road at Ballinacourra through the lands of Ballykeiffa, and to make about 10 perches of new road as far as the Deck road. The owner of the lands through which the twelve perches of new road are to be made has consented to the arrangement. District charge £300

186. To lower the road from Sheehan's Cross to Nelson's Cross, on the road from Limerick to Mountpelier, near Castleconnell; 25 perches long at £3 per perch; District charge, £75.

201. To put a special repair on road leading from Castletroy to the old Castle at Shannon Bank at a cost of £10; district charge.

202. To connect the county gullet at Linnait stream at Derryknockane cross, and erect a guard wall at same place; probable cost, £25 walls about two perches long and connection
