At a Privy Council meeting at Buckingham Palace, the King signed two proclamations, one appointing Saturday, 27th December, as a special day to be observed as a bank holiday and a public holiday in England, Wales, and Ireland, and the other setting apart Thursday, 1st of January, as a close day for banks only in the United Kingdom

Numerous friends in the city have heard with very sincere regret of the death of Mrs S C Jordan, which took place on Thursday night at St John's Parochial School from double pneumonia. She had been but a short time ill, and her demise in the prime of life is a great blow to her husband, sons and relatives. Some twelve months ago she suffered a keen bereavement in the loss of her only daughter, which a derminded her health.
