The transitions from severe frost to rain and thick fogs have been singularly rapid for some nights and days, particularly on the line from hence to Dublin, upon several parts of which it was found necessary to send persons on foot or on horseback before the public coaches to explore the way. A man who on Sunday preceded one of the coaches, with a lantern, had much difficulty to keep the road, and the want of a similar precaution at Dunkerrin, occasioned the mail-coach of the same morning to get upon the foot-path and upset, but providentially the passengers, coachman and guard, escaped unhurt. The horses having all fallen, were, with the harness, much injured, but being near the stables, others were immediately provided, and the mail, &c. arrived here soon after its appointed time.

On Tuesday night, a party of armed men attacked several houses in the barony of Kenry, and flogged the owners for having worked on the new mail-coach road, "contrary to the orders of Captain Rock!"

On Wednesday night, two men, from the neighbourhood of Ballybrown, who went to work for a man named Hacket, at Feereirk, in the same barony, were most desperately beaten, and one of them is now despaired of.

Information having been received by the Mayor on Sunday, that a man named John Dogherty, was about to be interred in the Irishtown, whose death was supposed to have been occasioned by some violent means, his Worship proceeded to the spot, and summoned an inquest; when, after a deliberate investigation, it appeared that the deceased had accidentally fallen down the steps of a cellar, by which his skull was fractured, and the Jury accordingly returned a verdict of *Accidental Death.*

Francis Bateman was charged before the Mayor and Mr. C. Marrett, on Saturday, with purchasing regimental necessaries from a soldier of the 84th, and being convicted thereof was sentenced three months imprisonment.

On Friday night, the Mills of Mr. H. Heagarty, at Mullinane, near Clouakilty, took fire, and were totally consumed, with a quantity of flour, wheat, and bran, contained therein. Apprehensions are entertained that the conflagration was malicious.

On Monday, a meeting took place, about two miles from Cork, between Drs. Orpen and Baldwin, of that City, the former Gentleman attended by R. T. Herbert, Esq. R. We have been informed that, at the instance of Colonel Bingham of the 25th Regiment, the harbour of Kinsale has been inspected, and an order has been received for that regiment to embark on Monday, in the transports for the West Indies. Regiments destined for foreign service, stationed in Kinsale, will embark from thence in the Bay instead of Cove.

After knowing this, will any one be so foolish as to withdraw from circulation the hording of the old Bank Tokens, no service to themselves, but of injury to the Country.

The Custom-House, with a view to the circulation of the Old Bank Tokens every day from 9 o'clock to 4 o'clock, the exclusion of almost any other business, who are composed chiefly of country gentlemen, has increased considerably in numbers. The number of Tokens about 3000*l.* daily. Friday is the last day of the proclamation for their exchange, and the current in Dublin, at their full value, to the 1st of January next.

A large quantity of Bank-tokens were in circulation in various parts of the County, and the exchanging them is not extended.

It is intended to send the new Copper Coins out of the Country, in the Commissariat, and will be required to bring up the old Silver Coins.

The Lords of the Treasury having taken into consideration the change of currency, passed in the last Session of Parliament, the new Currency of Ireland from the 5th of January next, a minute, bearing date the 5th inst. that the allowances of the Army shall, from the 1st of the military year, viz. 25th of December, be paid in British money, which may be considered a trifling increase in their pay, for as the Army was nominally the same, whether in Great Britain or Ireland, it was only a change of currency to the troops stationed in the Country. The Officers on retired full and half pay, and children of Officers, and the Penitentiary establishment, will receive the same amount of sterling money that they have hitherto done of Irish currency.

From the late depression in the price of pork, and the non-attendance of buyers, either stock were sold. There was a riot in the Town, but through the exertions of the Magistrate it was prevented, having succeeded in taking some of them prisoners; one Policeman's Cart was overturned, the stock, by a blow of a stone.

The fair of Limerick, on Monday, was the last season of the year, presented an unfavorable appearance. The cattle exhibited were few, and the buyers not many, and prices low.
