RESIGNATION OF THE MINISTRY.

FROM THE MORNING HERALD OF THURSDAY.
Sir Robert Peel's Government is at an end. All members of the Cabinet yesterday tendered their resignation, which her Majesty was pleased to accept. It will be easily believed that we regret this deterioration of her Majesty's advisers; but we should regret their unanimous determination to sacrifice the industry of the country, by stripping it of all protection.

There is, however, a report, that only a certain portion of the Cabinet is out, and that only Lords Wharncliffe, Ripon, Stanley, and Haddington retire, and that they are to be succeeded by Lords St. Germans, Ellenborough, and Dalhousie, and Mr. Gladstone.

FROM THE SUN OF THURSDAY.
Yesterday morning the majority of the Cabinet, comprising the Duke of Wellington, the Duke of Devonshire, Sir R. Peel, Sir J. Graham, the Earl of Aberdeen, Lord Stanley, Mr. Goulburn, the Earl of Lincoln, and Mr. Sydney Herbert—in all, nine out of the thirteen composing the entire Cabinet, proceeded by special train to Southampton, and were conveyed by the royal steamer Fairy, to the Isle of Wight, where they tendered their resignation to her Majesty.

The report says that Sir Robert Peel's resignation was accepted by her Majesty without hesitation, although Sir Robert Peel's line of intended policy would have had her Majesty's warm support. Lord John Russell was sent for; but, as the Noble Lord is at present in Edinburgh, some days must elapse before he can receive the summons.

THE NEW MINISTRY.

Immediately upon the refusal of the Duke of Wellington on Friday last, to carry out what he had agreed—namely, to propose a repeal of the corn-laws in the House of Lords—it became apparent that resignation of office by Sir Robert Peel must follow. Lord Russell was recommended to be sent for, and a messenger was dispatched on Saturday last to command his attendance at Osborne-house. His arrival was expected yesterday, and Sir Robert Peel expected to have met him. Sir Robert, however, died last night without having seen Lord John. This morning Lord John Russell and Sir Robert Peel had an interview of an hour's duration, after which Lord Russell left town for Cowes. He had an audience of her Majesty, and has returned to town this evening, having had full powers given him to form a Government. He has sent for Lord Palmerston, and is taking, it is believed, all the necessary steps to form an Administration.

Parliament is prorogued to the 30th instant, but not to meet then for the despatch of business; therefore, if Lord John Russell can form an administration, a dissolution of Parliament must of necessity, take place in the early part of the next week.

There is a rumour abroad that the Speaker has determined upon issuing an order authorising the lodgment of Railway deposits in three, four or five instalments, as may suit the convenience of the depositors.
