ported from Limerick in the last week.
The Aldermen of the new corporation of Dublin are
to wear gold chains.
Ten convicts left the County gaol on Monday, and
ten yesterday, for the Mountjoy convict depot, Dublin,
under a constabulary escort.
There was a large show of stock at the fair of
Dromin, on Monday last, the most part of which went
off, thought at very reduced prices. Prime beef only
averaged 32s per cwt.; sheep were scarce and brought
40s per cwt. All the heavy fat cattle were disposed
of for Cork market and for exportation.
The note circulation of the Bank of Ireland last
month exceeded that of all the other banks, but its
gold reserve was less than theirs by £50,000.

On Sunday morning the body of Mr. Timothy
Clanchy, of Upper William-street, who had been
missing from his family since the day after the recent
great storm, was washed ashore below the new dock
works, in a putrid and disfigured state. The friends
and relatives of the deceased on being apprised of the
circumstance, at once procured a coffin, and had the
remains conveyed to his former home, where an in-
quest was held yesterday, by Dr. Enright, Coroner,
the witnesses examined being his wife, Miss Jane
Dwyer, and two servants, whose testimony was to
the effect, that for months past Mr. Clanchy had dis-
played disquietude of mind, supposed to have been
occasioned by pecuniary losses sustained by railway,
and other speculations. There was no positive evi-
dence to show that he committed suicide by drowning,
but sufficient transpired to warrant strong presumption
that he had been driven to this desperate extremity.
The verdict returned was "found drowned." The
deceased was interred in the afternoon, at Six-mile-
bridge, county Clare, when the funeral was attended
by his two brothers, and a respectable procession of
friends in cabs and cars from Limerick.

THUNDER STORM—DEATHS BY LIGHTNING—A
melancholy occurrence took place in the neighbourhood
of Cooraclare. Mr. Pat Browne Burke, son of Mr.
Browne Burke, of Newgrove Cottage, was coming
from his lodge at Cahermurphy to Ennis, and turned
into the house of Mr. Pat Breene, of Kilmacduane, to
take shelter; whilst sitting by the side of the fire the
chimney of the house was struck by lightning, and
part of the fluid ran down by the wall close to where
Mr. Burke was sitting. The shock was so severe that
he fell on his face on the floor and never after shewed
a sign of life. Mr. Breene and others were sitting
close about him. A servant man of Mr. Burke's was
burned along the back by the fluid, and a third person
was also severely injured.
Six cows were killed by the electric fluid at New-
castle, in this County, on Saturday last, in the thunder
storm.

Three fine milch cows and a donkey, belonging to

and killed by the lightning.
