On Thursday night last, David Gilligan, a butcher's boy returning from Banratty, fell from his horse at Cratloe, and was killed on the spot.

Yesterday evening, a woman named Gannery, was found dead in her lodging, in Saep-street, having hung herself from a beam.

A most daring outrage was committed in the neighbourhood of Rathkeale, on Christmas Day, at so early an hour as three o'clock in the afternoon. A party of villains attacked Clough-House, the residence of Lieut. James Delmage, late of the 23d Fusiliers, whilst from home, who, after wounding and much abusing some of his servants, who made resistance, they took two guns, with some ammunition. Mr. Delmage, on hearing the circumstance, he, with two of Mr. Going's Police, assisted by his brother and a party of the Palatine Yeomen Infantry, pursued the villains, and succeeded in taking several of them prisoners, five of whom have been fully identified. AGRICULTURAL INTERESTS

Statement of the oppressive disabilities on the Agriculture of Ireland in its Intercourse with England.

I cannot call the attention of the Public to the statement of facts which delineate a comprehensive and continued series of injustices imposed on the exports of our Trade, which neither but the continued an- exactions of other acts in this Kingdom nor any in Irish Spirits, by the Act of Union, and for some years past, were imported into England at any of the expense, but it is interest to make them was paid according to the strength; and they allowed to be sold to all persons having licenses and paying any reduction in strength. All Sp. Holland, France, Spain, and the West Indies, allowed this privilege.

The English Distillers, however, finding that they were in great demand in England, and were fast increasing, contrived to smuggle an Act through of Commons late in the Session, when few Irish were at their post, namely the 54th Geo. III. cap. 13, which requires Irish Spirits to be warehoused in Great Britain, and to be reduced to over proof by Syke's Hydrometer. This Act remains in force, and ought to be repealed.

By another oppressive Act, 5th Geo. III. chap. 11, Raw Spirits are prohibited from being sold in this country, not being entered Rectifiers of Sp. which immediately extinguishing cannot be used not to sell any Irish Spirits whatever, on the exportation of that market. This last measure Parliament, through the press-worship exerted Mr. Delmage, General Burt, and some others, who in last Session, by an Act of Geo. GENERAL ORDER

" Sir — The Commissioners direct, that permits if requested, for the removal of any Irish Spirits of a higher degree of strength than 24 per cent. by Syke's Hydrometer, to any dealer or retailer, person not being an entered Distiller or Rectifier in England, and, that if any application for any such permit, the matter be immediately reported to the Excise Office, London, July 22, 1829.
