On Thursday, in Cork, where he had been for change of air, John Abell, Esq., of Corbally, near this city. This much regretted gentleman was a highly respectable and leading member of the Society of Friends, and for many years carried on the most extensive business of a hardware and silver plate merchant in Limerick, affording, by his amiability of manner and strict rectitude, the greatest possible satisfaction in his dealings. In times of famine or disease he took a leading part in forwarding every undertaking which had for its object the relief of the poor and destitute, without distinction of creed, combining charity with a meekness of manner which endeared him to all classes. Since retirement from business Mr. Abell devoted himself chiefly to the science of botany, of which he was an admirer, and his name is well known throughout Ireland as the inventor of improved kitchen ranges. The deceased was a native of Cork, and had been long labouring under bronchitis.
