DEATH OF JOHN BASSETT, ESQ., T.C.

In our last publication we had only time to announce the rather unexpected death upon that evening of John Bassett, Esq., T.C., the highly respected and much esteemed proprietor of the LIMERICK CHRONICLE. The sad event has deprived the citizens of Limerick and community at large of as kind, considerate, and well disposed a gentleman as could adorn society. At all times anxious to alleviate the wants of the poor, his energies were directed in the proper quarter; and through him, the columns of this journal were ever open to the gratuitous insertion of matters calculated to prove of benefit, and advantage to the public. Endowed with facilities of a high order, he united business habits with a mild and considerate combination of feeling towards others rarely to be met with, while in disposition and amiability were centered all the high attributes worthy of a good man. As an employer he could not be excelled for characteristic urbanity and unostentation, for it invariably afforded him pleasure to contribute to the requirements of those connected with the establishment of which he was the head. Generous and affectionate in the family circle, his worth could not be sufficiently known, and those who have been left to deplore his loss will treasure with sorrowful remembrance the attributes of one so universally regretted, and who departed this life at the age of 50 years. This morning his remains were interred in the family vault at St. Munchin's Church. The funeral cavalcade was highly respectable, the Mayor and Corporation attending in mourning attire, with the merchants and traders of Limerick following in the mournful procession, which was closed by a line of respectable private equipages. Upon arrival at the grave yard the coffin was removed from the hearse to the interior of the church, where the last solemn service for the dead was carried out by Rev. Messrs. Hare and Mahony Watson, and the body was then consigned to its last resting place. The Masonic Brethren of Lodges 13 and 73, with members of other masonic bodies attended, and paid that respect to their departed brother for which the craft is proverbial, and which has earned for them the appellation of "The Brethren of the Mystic Tie."

The funeral arrangements were carried out in most creditable style and with much satisfaction by Messrs. Moore and Manning, and Mr. Peter M'Carthy, of George's-street.

By a recent order of the Irish Privy Council it was ordered that there be paid into the Bank of Ireland to the credit of the Commissioners of Lunatic Asylums the sum of £4,500 on account of the works and alterations in the old workhouse of Clonmel, which is to be converted into an auxiliary lunatic asylum for the Clonmel district of the county Tipperary.

Lieutenant J. M'Loughlin, 11th Hussars, is granted leave of absence to 10th February next.

A War Office circular has been received at Chatham, directing that all claims of discharged soldiers for compensation in lieu of clothing are to be adjusted prior to the men receiving their discharge either at their own depots or at the invalid depot.

A circular has been issued from the War Office laying down a code of rules for the free supply of Protestant, Presbyterian, and Catholic religious books to soldiers, at the expense of the public.

The chartered schooner, Jane Sophia, arrived at the Pigeon-house Fort yesterday, from London, with ammunition for the garrison.

The Sergeant-Major who was shot at Aldershott, on the 6th instant, is still in a very dangerous state, but recovery is not improbable. The prisoner charged with the crime was brought up, but remanded for a week.

DEPARTURE OF TROOPS.—Yesterday, 35 privates and non-commissioned officers and one officer, belonging to the 16th Regiment, embarked on board the Windsor steamer at the North-wall, en route from Templemore to Sheffield. During the embarkation, a private named James Hopkins accidentally fell into the water, but was immediately rescued by one of the boats, named Glannan, without having sustained any injury.

A splendid ball took place at Caher Barracks on Monday night, and was given on a scale of great excellence, by the Colonel and officers of the 4th Q.O. Hussars. Eighty of the elite of the district were present, and dancing was kept up in the handsomely decorated Mess-room until four o'clock next morning; supper was served in a really elegant style in the ante-room, and was liberally supplied with the finest wines, and the season's delicacies.
