AMERICA.

QUEENSTOWN, FRIDAY NIGHT.—The Royal mail steamship Persia, with New York dates to the 16th, has arrived. The steamers City of Washington and Asia had arrived out.

General McClellan officially reports to the War Department that Colonel Pegram had surrendered, with 600 Confederate, at Beverly; that General Monro had pursued and routed a large body of Confederates at St. George. General Garnett, commanding the Confederates, was killed.

The Federal loss is reported to have been thirteen killed; the Confederate loss 200 killed, and seven guns and 1,000 prisoners captured.

General McClellan's despatch concludes thus—"Our success is complete, and I firmly believe Secession is killed in Western Virginia."

The *Herald's* Washington correspondent says the British Consul at Charleston had forwarded Lord Lyons documents concerning the breaking of the Chesapeake blockade by private persons with the permission of the Federal Government. Among the documents are passes signed by General Butler permitting vessels to pass the blockade.

The House of Representatives have passed a resolution that, if the Senate concurred, Congress should adjourn on the 19th of July.

A resolution offered by Providence, for a National Convention for the restoration of peace, was lost, the votes being 92 to 51.

HAVANNA, JULY.—The privateer steamer Sumter has eight American ships, sugar laden, on the South side of Cuba; burnt one, and took seven with prize crews into Cienfuegos. One report states that the Captain-General at Cuba had released them. Another report states that he retained them, to refer matters to Madrid.
