

DEATH OF CAPTAIN AND ADJUTANT GRANT, 17th DEPOT BATTALION.

We deeply regret to announce the sudden death, at his quarters, New Barracks, in this garrison, on Sunday last, of Captain and Adjutant John Henry Grant, 17th Depot Battalion, aged 42 years, an officer highly esteemed, and respected by his comrades in arms.

THE FUNERAL.

If public sympathy and respect indicate the feelings of sorrow for departed worth, the display made this day upon the sad occasion of the funeral of the late Captain Grant, the demonstration was most mournful and imposing.
