AND ADJUTANT DEATH OF CAPTAIN GRANT, 17TH DEPOT BATTALION.

We deeply regret to announce the sudden death, at his quarters, New Barracks, in this garrison, on Sunlast, of Captain and Adjutant John Henry Grant, th Depot Battalion, aged 42 years, an officer highly steemed, and respected by his comrades in arms The sad event, on becoming known, cast a sorrowful gloom in military circles, owing to the loss so unexpectedly sustained, and when the rumour spread through the barrack rooms the men of the Battalion gave vent to feelings of unsuppressed sorrow at his demise. The deceased officer died of epilepsy, in the bosom of his fond and affectionate wife and family, to whom he was attached with the devotedness of a kind husband and loving parent. The hand of death has in this instance struck down as kind hearted and considerate an officer as ever distinguished the British service, for in the discharge of his official duty he was never swayed by private feeling or animosity even against the humblest non-commissioned officer or private, for if he could not speak well of a man, he would never utter a word to his prejudice. Pursuing the praiseworthy maxim of "Do unto others as you would wish to be done by," he maintained for himself the character of a just and upright officer, and consequently was beloved and venerated by all with whom he was brought in contact. In social life he was admired for affability and gentlemanly demeanour, and deservedly so, as his manner was engaging and agreeable.

THE FUNERAL. If public sympathy and respect indicate the feelings of sorrow for departed worth, the display made this day upon the sad occasion of the funeral of the late in Grant, the demonstration was most mournful and imposing. At half past ten o'clock the officers and men of the 17th Depot Battalion, under Colonel Borton, C.B., and men of a Brigade of Royal Artillery, under Major Greene, paraded at the New Barracks, where 33 members of the Eden Masonic Lodge, No. 73, of which he was a brother, also assembled, to pay the last sad tribute of respect to one of the "Mystic-Tie" for whom the Lodge entertained fraternal regard. The necessary arrangements having been made in due military form, the body of deceased was brought from his apartments and placed upon one of the Armstrong guns, the carriage of which was drawn by six horses in sable trappings. Upon the coffin lay the sword and hat of the deceased, and precisely at a quarter to eleven

the funeral procession moved on from the barrack square in the following order:

A firing party of 100 men, under Captain M Pherson, 17th; Lieuts. Cummins and Thompson, 9th; the band of the Depot Battalion, playing the dead march in Saul; the body, borne as described, the coffine covered with a pall, the officers who walked at each covered with a pall; the officers who walked at each side of the coffin as pall bearers were, Captains Dun-bar, Boyd, Gambell, Treherne, Grantham, and Berespar, boyd, tramoen, Trenerne, trramman, and beresford; the horse of deceased, led by a groom. Then followed, according to rank and military regulations, Colonel Borton, C.B.; Major Younge; Paymaster Phair; Lieutenant and Quartermaster Burke, Dr. Brush, Assistant Surgeons S. Ferguson and W. Ferguson, of the Staff Cantain Grocan Barrackguson, of the Staff; Captain Grogan, Barrack-master; T. W. Cooper, Esq., Deputy Purveyor, &c. The entire of the officers of the Provisional Battalion, with those of the Royal Artillery, including Major Greene, came next in the procession wearing crape on their left arm, cap and sword or wearing crape on their left arm, cap and sword or-naments also enclosed with crape, and walking four a breast, flanked on each side by the members of Eden Masonic Lodge 73, also wearing crape. The non-commissioned officers of the Battalion and Royal Artillery, came next in order, according to rank, the rear being closed by upwards of 1,000 rank and file comprising the 17th Depot Battalion, and 120 men of the Royal Artillery. The route was by the Military-Froad, Crescent, Tontine, George's-street, Patrick-street, Rutland-street, over New-bridge to Mary-street, Nicholas-street, and Cemetry at King's Island. Along the whole the passages were lined with spectators, and the shutters were put up in almost every tators, and the shutters were put up in almost every establishment, and each of the drapery concerns of T. Revington and Company, and Cannock, Tait and Company, paying special respect by lowering the window blinds, and partially suspending business for the time. Several Magistrates, Corporators, and other respectable citizens joined in the procession, which having reached the grave yard the usual military formalities were observed, and there the coffin was borne to the building erected for the performance of the service of the dead, Rev. John Elmes, garrison chaplain, officiating. This solemn ceremony having been lain, officiating. This solemn ceremony having been gone through, the remains of Adjutant Grant were consigned to their last resting place, when the three farewell rounds were fired, and the grave closed over one whose memory will be long cherished by his brother officers, who, we understand are determined to raise a suitable monument over his grave. The funeral, and other arrangements connected with the family bereavement of the deceased officer, were kindly and considerately undertaken by Lieutenant and Quartermaster Bourke, whose exertions in this time of grief are highly to be commended.
