lowed. This fact ought to reassure French mer-chants; but, nevertheless; M. Jules Favre said that, in consequence of the desire expressed in the Assembly, he would make fresh diplomatic efforts to settle the question.

The Chamber proceeded with the discussion of the bill respecting the caution money to be depo-

sited by founders of newspapers.

M. Lambrecht remarked that the matter in hand was not a bill on the Press, but merely concerned the question of caution money.

The Assembly decided to postpone the vote until

the second reading.
Versailles, Wednesday Evening. In to-day's sitting of the National Assebuly the bill relating to caution money required of news-

paper proprietors was again discussed.

M. Lambricht, replying to M. Louis Blanc, said

-"In our time thought is entirely free to express itself." He repeated that the system of depositing caution money was a necessory concomitant on the existing laws on the Press. If the Assembly wished to give unlimited liberty to the Press, those laws would fall to the ground, and with them the caution money system.

M. Savary made a speech, in which he maintained that the Government had not used the means of

repression provided by the laws.

M. Dufaure replied that the Government had exercised its right of prosecuting newspapers, citing in proof several cases in which convictions had been obtained from juries. He explained that in some cases editors who had infringed the laws had not been prosecuted because it had been deemed inopportune or dangerous to do so. Clause 1 of the bill abrogating the decree which abolished the caution money, was passed by 329 votes against 202.

THE COURTS-MARTIAL AT PARIS. Paris, Wednesday.

The latest return confirms the result of the elections, which gives an additional majority of 100 votes to the policy of M. Thiers, or the maintenance of the Republican status quo. The courtsmartial for the trial of the insurgents will open on the 10th and 12th inst.

The policy of the Presse will be based, it is said, on the principle of Parliament tary liberty and sovereignty of the nation. The first sacks of new wheat and flour derived from the crop of 1871 have arrived at the Paris markets.

General Faidherbe has addressed a letter to the Liberte in which he argues that the organization of the French army should be founded upon three principles—viz., that military service should be compulsory, that its duration should be reduced to two years, and that the young soldier should return home more educated and better conducted

men than when they left.
