Great excitement prevails at Bonmahon, County Waterford, consequent upon a visit to that locality by the Redemptorist Fathers, whose mission is opposed by the local clergy, who have formed themselves into a body to make a counter movement, and challenged the Redemptorists to controversial discussions, which the latter, acting sub-silentio, have declined to accept. On Thursday, the feast of Corpus Christi, the Protestant clergy proceeded from the Rectory towards the Chapel, where they arrived before the people were out, and found a large crowd standing in front which they passed through, two and two—Rev. Messrs. Wilkinson, and Parker in front, Rev. Messrs. Hanlon and Gloster in the middle, and Rev. Messrs. De Renzy and Fitzpatrick in the rear. Some boys raised a shout, and this naturally caused great excitement, when some persons were heard to say in Irish "crush them." There was a good deal of pushing about, but nothing more occurred. Although they have not succeeded in inducing the Redemptorists to 'plead' before the people, and prove irom the Scriptures that what they are teaching is from God, yet the clergy are delivering sermons, and special addresses to their own congregations.
