CLONROD FAIR, DEC. 3.—This fair was but insufficiently supplied with stock, for which the demand was considerable. All on sale were purchased at prices greatly in advance of recent fairs held in this county. The few fat beasts on sale were sold at prices varying from 45s. to 58s. per cwt., according to quality ; store bullocks, of which the supply was very limited and quality inferior, reached for three-year old from £10 to £12, and for two-years year old from 29 to £11 ; even as high as £12 was paid for a few good two-year old ; store heifers, two-year old, brought from £9 to £12 ; in-calf heifers brought from £10 to £13. The supply of sheep was very large, and demand very slack ; the appearance of several lots indicating the return of rot so extensive in the last year. However, some good lots were on offer, and their owners ready to give engagements of their soundness ; but, except for fat sheep for local markets, which sold at from 6d. to 6 1/2 d. per lb., the transactions in sheep were few. The supply of pigs was very large, but by 50 means in excess of the demand. Prices ranged from 40s. to 48s., according to quality. There appeared to be a general impression that this would prove a clearance fair for the pigs of this district, owing to the deficient supply of pig feeding in the hands of the poorer cottiers and labourers, who are the great pig feeders of this county.

Captain Johnstone has been unanimously elected Mayor of Waterford, for 1862.

Joseph Kenny, Esq., J.P., one of the oldest and most respected members of the Clonmel Corporation, and several times Mayor of that borough, has resigned his Aldermanic gown and retired from the council.

John Molloy, hotel waiter, tried in the Commission Court Dublin, on Thursday, for the murder of his two children, was acquitted upon the grounds of insanity.

The salaries of the officers in the Cashel workhouse amount to £808 per annum. The total expense of the establishment amount to 1 1/2 d. in the pound on the nett annual value of the union.

The Tralee Constabulary are busily engaged in the seizure of light weights and false measures, an example which ought to be followed in every city and town in Ireland.

The Town Commissioners of Cashel have been reluctantly compelled to give the Town-town for the purposes of a lecture by Mr. Doheny, because of a threat held out that if they refused the doors would be broken in. What we ask, is the use of a police force in Cashel ?

Lawrence Dooly, a boatman, and a native of Carrick-on-Suir, was burned to a cinder in the locker of his hooker, as she lay a anchor in the Suir at Waterford on Saturday night. The deceased and his comrade, Maurice Heley, returned from the city in a state of intoxication, and at dawn in the locker to smoke, when, falling asleep the straw on which they were sitting took fire. Heley was nearly suffocated before he escaped, whilst his unlucky comrade was consumed in the flames.

Mr. Hermit, o the "Example Farm," Blarney, county Cork, has at present two lambs on his farm over a week old.

Several outrages have been committed in Ennis by gentlemen (9) on the spree, who amuse themselves by breaking windows and wrenching off knockers from hall doors situate in lonesome localities. The attention of the magistracy has been directed to these outrages, the perpetrators of which should be severely punished.

A farm-house belonging to the Upton reformatory at Cork, wa maliciously set on fire on Saturday night last, by some incendiary. Several cows, with a quantity of hay and straw, valued at £100 were consumed. An inmate named Patrick Finn, who absconded a the previous night is suspected, and has been arrested. It is supposed that he was aided in this nefarious act by an accomplice.

The annual income was £119,353 3s. and the accumulated fund £412,016 0s. 1d. The claims by death for the year amounted only to £3,983 2s. 8d. The chairman, James Hay, Esq. merchant, Leith, congratulated the meeting on the highly prosperous position of the company, and traced its progress from its commencement in 1846 to the present time, entering very fully into the special advantages afforded by the Colonial from the basis of its operations being on so extended a scale, local boards and agencies being established in every quarter of the British dominions, where premiums can be received and claims settled. He also referred to the home scheme introduced by the company, whereby free and unconditional policies are granted without any restrictions whatever as to residence, on payment of extra premium.
